DO YOU KNOW WHERE YOUR TRASH GOES?

That was the question asked by James Soule, Mayor of South Portland and the newest Board Member and visiting speaker for Regional Waste

The question was also asked during a random survey of three hundred South Portland residents...the response: I DON'T KNOW! Although more than 87 percent of South Portland's residents consider themselves environmentally conscious and concerned about the regional trash situation, only 16 percent knew where their trash went!

Gazing around the Purpoodock Club at the members there assembled it would be safe to bet that the same percentages were represented. Where does

The majority of trash generated in the Greater Portland area is most likely destined for the Regional Waste System's incinerator on Blueberry Hill Road in Portland. It may not be where you'll find your thrill, but it is where Cape Elizabeth's trash goes....and South Portland's, Portland's, Scarborough's as well as trash from 31 other towns and cities in Maine.

What is Regional Waste Systems (or RWS)? It is a non-profit cooperative incorporated by the four towns and cities mentioned previously. It began as a joint venture several years ago and has grown into one of the world's most effecient and environmentally

correctfacilities.

So, that is where the trash goes! RWS is also aggresively pursuing markets for recycled materials and products made from the incinerators' ash. Jim showed a brief video which followed the trash from the curb to the incinerator. It also showed the various methods of collecting recyclable materials.

There were some questions and answers following with the most popular one being: Why are the cans and bottles (glass) put into the same section of the recycling bins (SILVER BULLETS) now? I used to be so careful keeping everything seperate!

It seems that all the recyclables get dumped onto the same floor and seperated at the same time...it does help having them somewhat seperated.

"However; Cape residents will be required to seperate the various items!" heckled a S.P. Rotarian.

Dan manages one of six districts for the company and gave us a lot of information about the pulp and paper industry, and about his company. Great Northern is the largest land owner in Maine, owning 2.1 million acres. It has 2 pulp and paper mills and will be opening a recycling plan in June which will recycle 400 tons a day!

The forest industry is vital to Maine's economy, creating \$3.5 billion a year in products and employing over 30,000 people. The industry has changed a lot over the years and now uses computers to map the forest and help them make decisions, such as:

- · Whether to clear cut or partial cut
- How to lessen the impact of windthrow (in 1978, 6,000 acres blew down in one afternoon!)
- · How to create biodiversity
- When to use herbicides (Roundup) to control competing vegetation
- How to conduct forest operations without endangering the safety of the thousands of visitors
- How to manage the bald eagle residents of the forest

Anns, the predecessor of our current
Power Partners. I had always
assumed that the name was just a
cutesy invention, but here's the real story: "The year was 1914 when Strancisco Rotarians boarded 1914 special train to attend the Rotary convention in Houston. In those days few wives attended Rotary events, and until the train stopped in Los Angeles, the only woman aboard was the wife of Rotarian Bru Brunnier. As the train picked up additional convention-bound delegates, Mrs. Ann Brunnier was introduced as the Rotarian's Ann. This title soon became "Rotary Ann." Since the clubs of the West were inviting the Rotarians to hold their next meeting in San Francisco, a number of songs and stunts were organized to be performed in Houston. Largest Unfunded Liability "The Facing Americans Today"

This was a quote from our speaker John McVey of Unum in describing long term care. He defined long term care as "the kind of help you need if you are unable to care for yourself because of a prolonged illness or disability." It ranges from help with daily activities (eating, dressing, etc.) to skilled nursing care in a nursing home.

John presented some very sobering statistics about the changes in our population and the cost of long term care. One in two Americans over age 65 will require long term care. As baby boomers get older, population over age 50 is expected to increase 74% over the next 30 years, while the population under age 50 will increase only 1% in that same time period. Consequently by the year 2020 the ratio of non-workers to workers will be 1.8:1. This contrasts with a ratio of 40:1 in 1935. Therefore it is unlikely that payroll taxes will be able to foot the bill for long term care. John the bill for long term care. John pointed out the advantages of long term care insurance as a vehicle for funding long term care and described what to look for in choosing a long term care policy.
