

"WHAT WOULD YOU DO IF A CHILD'S LIFE WERE WITHIN YOUR ARM'S REACH?

The need for blood donations is as blinding as the flashing lights of a rescue vehicle...or as faint as the prayer of a child with leukemia." This quotation is from the American Red Cross Blood Services booklet on plateletpheresis. Ellen Russell of ARC Blood Services spoke to us at the invitation of Adrienne Murphy about the need for blood, the new donor guidelines and the plateletpheresis donor program. Plateletpheresis donors have their platelets withdrawn from their blood on a recurring basis in a 90-minute procedure. These are very generous individuals who are repaid with the knowledge that they are literally saving lives. Ellen spoke of one patient who has had 14000 platelet transfusions so far in order to stay alive while awaiting a marrow transplant.

Upcoming blood drives in South Portland are at the Marriott (August 3) and the Coast Guard base (August 31). If you have any questions about donating blood, call the ARC at 775-2367 or 800-482-0743.

ROTARY'S WHEEL IMBLEM: A wheel has been the symbol of Rotary since our early it days. The first design was may by Chicago Rotarian Montague Bear, an engraver who drew a simple wagon wheel, with a few lines to show dust and motion. The wheel was said to illustrate "Civilization and Movement." Most of the early clubs had some form of wagon wheel on their publications and letterheads. Finally, in 1922, it was decided that all Rotary clubs should adopt a single design as the exclusive emblem of Rotarians. Thus, in 1923, the present gear wheel, with 24 cogs and six spokes was adopted by the "Rotary International Association." A group of engineers advised that the geared wheel was mechanically unsound and would not work without a "keyway" in the center of the gear to attach it to a power shaft. So, in 1923 the keyway was added and the design which we now know was formally adopted as the official Rotary International emblem. from The ABC's of Rotary by Cliff Dochterman

AN ELECTRIFYING PROGRAM!

Paul Butler conducted to the podium our guest speaker, PUC Commissioner **Bill Nugent.** Bill gave an energetic presentation and discussed several highly charged issues. The timeframe was of limited capacitance so Bill had to be a condenser of information.

What is the potential for the use of windmills to provide electricity?

Four years later, the admiral carried a Rotary flag in his expedition to the North Pole.

expedition to the North Pole. Some Rotary clubs use the official Rotary flag as a banner at club meetings. In these instances it is appropriate to print the words "Rotary Club" above the wheel symbol, and the name of the city, state or nation below the emblem.

The Rotary flag is always prominently displayed at the World Headquarters as well as at all conventions and oficial events of Rotary International.

ONE LIGHT

Very fittingly, our program was about one of the "lights" pictured at the top of this page. Mike McGovern brought us Cheryl Milligan, director of the Museum at Portland Head Light, who was introduced by Paul Butler.

Cheryl had good news and bad news on the painting front. The good news is that she had budgeted for the house to be painted professionally every 3 years. The bad news is that they have now acquired the tower as well as the house and the Coast Guard will no longer be responsible for painting the tower. Unfortunately there is no room in the museum's budget for painting the tower. Cheryl reported that over 20,000 people visited the museum last year. The museum and the Fort Williams diorama in particular, are especially interesting to visitors who were stationed at Fort Williams. The museum's major source of income is the gift shop, which has done much better than Cheryl & Mike ever expected. Plans for the future include a walking tour of Fort Williams and collaborative work with the Spring Point Museum and other museums.

SEPTEMBER is Youth Activities Month. Let's look at two Rotary programs which focus on youth.

INTERACT

Interact, the Rotary youth program, was launched by the R.I. Board of Directors in 1962. The first Interact club was established by the Rotary Club of Melbourne, Florida. Interact clubs provide opportunities for boys and girls of secondary school age to work together in a world fellowship of service and international understanding. The term, Interact, is derived from "inter" for international and "act" for action. Every Interact club must be sponsored and supervised by a Rotary club and must plan annual projects of service to its school, community and in the world. Today there are over 7,000 Interact clubs with more than 160,000 members "Interactors" in 101 countries. develop skills in leadership and attain practical experience in conducting service projects, thereby learning the satisfaction that comes from serving others. A major goal of Interact is to provide opportunites for young people to create greater understanding and goodwill with youth throughout the world.

Each summer thousands of young people are selected to attend Rotary-sponsol . leadership camps or seminars the United States, Australia, Canada, India, France, Argentina, Korea and numerous other countries. In an informal out-of-doors atmosphere, 50 to 75 outstanding youngmen and/or women spend a week in a challenging program of discussions, inspirational addresses, leadership training and social activities designed to enhance personal development, leadership skills and good citizenship. The official name of this activity is the Rotary Youth Leadership Awards program (RYLA), although the event is occasionally referred to as Camp Royal, Camp Enterprise, Youth Leaders Seminars, Youth Conferences or other terms.

The RYLA program began in Australia in 1959, when young people throughout the state of Queensland were selected to meet with Princess Alexandra, the young cousin of Queen Elizabeth II. The Rotarians of Brisbane, who hosted the participants, were impressed with the quality of the young leaders. It was decided to bring youth leaders together each year for a week of social, cultural and educational activities. The RYLA program gradually grew throughout all the Rotary districts of Australia and New Zealand. In 1971, the R.I. Board of Directors adopted RYLA as an official program of Rotary International.



It was great to have female voices (especially **Pam Stewart's**) to help us in singing "God Bless America" at our 9/29 meeting, Spouses Night. After **Karen Dunfey** gave the invocation, we sat down to an unusually tasty dinner, but what dinner isn't tasty that ends with chocolate mousse? In addition to spouses, we were joined by **Belinda Snell**, director of guidance at Cape Elizabeth High School, three excellent speakers, and a daughter here and there.

Tom & Rita Hennessy led us in singing "You're a Grand Ole Flag." Rita was well rewarded for doing this with a gift certificate to DiMillo's, donated by Dick Yerxa, which she won in David Kane's raffle.

Our three speakers each represented a Rotary program which enriched their lives in some way. The first was **Christine D'Alfonso**, a junior at Portland High School, who attended a RYLA Leadership Camp this summer. Fifty students from Maine, Massachusetts & New Hampshire attended the 4-day camp at UNE in Biddeford. Christine reported that they played games, solved problems and attended seminars. She was very enthusiastic about the camp and about the new friends she had made.

Kimberly Stewart told us about her experience as a foreign exchange student in Brazil. Kim knew no Portuguese when she set off for Sao Paulo but became fluent within a few months through the aid of the first family she stayed with. Kim said that one of the best parts of her exchange experience was this first family, who welcomed her as one of their own. Kim's Brazilian adventure didn't end when she came back to Cape Elizabeth - one of the friends she made there will be coming to the U.S. in December and staying with the Stewarts for 8 months!

Our third speaker, Nancy Drapeau, spoke of her year in Nice on a Rotary Foundation Ambassadorial Scholarship. This was not Nancy's first overseas encounter with Rotary however. After graduating from college she had worked in a Vietnamese refugee camp in the Philippines. While not connected with Rotary at the time, she found herself working side by side with Rotarians. Like Kim, Nancy found sharing the family life of her host families to be one of the nicest aspects of her year in Nice. Nancy concluded by sharing with us the following quotation from Camus' Resistance, Rebellion and Death which she felt summed up the purpose of the Rotary Foundation:

"Great ideas, it has been said, come into the world as gently as doves. Perhaps then, if we listen attentively, we shall hear, amid the uproar of empires and nations, a faint flutter of wings, the gentle stirring of life and hope. Some will say that this hope lies in a nation; others, in a man. I believe rather that it is awakened, revived, nourished by millions of solitary individuals whose deeds and words every day negate frontiers and the crudest implications of history. As a result, there shines forth fleetingly the ever threatened truth that each and every man, on the foundation of his own sufferings and joys, builds for all."

Having just read Paul Harris' My Road to Rotary, I was struck with the similarity between this quote and Paul Harris' vision of Rotary. Note how it dovetails (bad pun!) with these words of Paul Harris:

"Rotary is a miniature model of a world at peace, one which might advantageously be studied by nations. Rotarians believe that the universal application of tolerance and friendliness. would bring about the international peace so earnestly desired by everyone."

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
