THE GUBERNATORIAL ADDRESS

The highlight of the evening was of course the address by District Governor Dick Clark. Dick brought greetings from the District and RI President Bob Barth, recognized several individuals, expressed his disappointment in missing Sam and Dan M., and went on to outline his goals for District 7780 this year. His primary goals are:

1. For membership to increase by 10%, and

2. To raise \$100,000 for the Rotary Foundation.

Judging from the content of his speech, this latter goal is very important to Dick. He discussed many of the projects made possible by Foundation money:

*The Group Study Exchange (GSE) program. This year we will be exchanging teams with a district in India.

*The Ambassadorial Scholarship program. A Bowdoin College student from Bucksport (Jason Moore) who was sponsored by the Brunswick club will receive this scholarship for 1994-95 through our district. He will use the scholarship to study International Law at Cambridge.

*The PolioPlus program. So far over 1/2 billion people have been immunized as a result of this program.

the University of Iowa. Some reflections from his college

While enroute to Iowa a year earlier the boy from a Vermont vi lage had lent a week in Chicago where the unrest and wickedness of the bustling Western City possessed him with a weird fascination. It was all so different from his Valley. But he sensed something vital in it all. It was a place to study the ways of men. Was there some place to which men flocked? If so, what was the attraction? What were the underlying motives which influenced the lives of men? Why were some good and others bad? Why did some make sacrifices? Did they pay? If so, how? Why were others wasteful in their physical, mental, and moral resources? What did they get out of it? Was there wisdom in grandfather's precepts - or was he simply a well-meaning but deluded old fogey?

As the writer now looks back at his experiences in the various educational institutions, he is prone to question himself as to what, if anything, he got out of them; what, if anything, was there to justify his grandfather's sacrifices and hopes? Was it worthwhile?

The best thing that the writer got from his experiences in educational institutions came from his contacts with other students. In scholastics he cannot lay claim to have gotten much except, perhaps, a love of good books by writers of many lands.

They pointed out that the plan is not expected to decrease healthcare costs, but to slow the rapid acceleration of these costs. Liverpool and its suburbs were all Paul got to see before he had to return on another ship of the same line. Great was his disappointment at not being able to see London and he resolved to endure again even such hardships that he might visit the

British metropolis.



CHAPTER 6 - THE FIRST ROTARY CLUB

Since the alternative minimum tax (AMT) rates have increased, don't I have to be careful about giving away

too much and wasting contributions?

No. Charitable contributions are still deductible even if you're in AMT. There are income limitations on the charitable contributions deduction, but excess amounts are carried forward. If your tax bracket changes from year to year, the tax savings from your charitable contributions may be greater in one year than another.

This tax talk is starting to get boring. Are there any other implications to the Foundation being a separate organization?

Yes. In order to qualify as a charitable organization, the Foundation cannot be perceived as benefitting its own members. Therefore Rotarians and their families are not eligible to benefit from Rotary Foundation programs. This means that they cannot receive Ambassadorial scholarships or participate on GSE teams (other than as team leaders).

Well then, who is eligible for Ambassadorial scholarships and GSE teams?

There are no longer any age or marital restrictions on eligibility for these programs. Ambassadorial scholarship recipients must have completed at least 2 years of university-level study or work experience. Depending on the type of scholarship, there may be additional requirements (e.g. language). GSE team members must have worked for at least 2 years in their business or profession and be proficient in the language of the host country.

Who will we be exchanging with in the GSE program after India?

Next year we will exchange with Germany and for 1995-96 we are tentatively scheduled to exchange with Japan.

In recognition of Rotary Foundation Month, I will be departing from our usual format and devoting most of this week's and next week's bulletins to a 2-part Q & A series on the Rotary Foundation. Therefore I will be postponing news from the meetings until the Dec. 1 bulletin. As you'll note, the program on that day is just a classification talk from another accountant. (Did you stop and think before you let all these accountants in the club that every last one of them would be giving a classification talk on bean-counting!)

WHY THE ROTARY FOUNDATION?

Why is there a Rotary Foundation? Why not just carry out all Rotary activities through Rotary International?

The Rotary Foundation, unlike Rotary International, is a tax-exempt charitable organization. This means that all contributions to the Foundation are tax-deductible.

But I don't see the need for a separate organization - I deduct my Rotary club dues anyway. Wouldn't it be simpler to give extra donations to my Rotary club rather than to the Foundation?

There are several reasons why this is not a feasible option.

1. Many contributors to the Rotary Foundation are not members of Rotary.

2. Through 1993, many businesses can deduct Rotary club dues as a business expense because of the perceived value of building goodwill in the community. However if contributions are made in excess of the required fees, the IRS would presume that the member received something of value in return, especially in light of the fact that Rotary has a venue (the Foundation) for true charitable contributions.

3. Beginning in 1994 Rotary club dues will no longer be deductible as business expenses.

Group Stady Exchange seems like a free vacation for a handful of people? What does it really accomplish?

A GSE team member returning to the U.S. from Nigeria answered that question this way:

"Perhaps nothing concrete. Maybe it was just learning how to accept people from another country for themselves - not expecting them to be like us - learning how to understand their struggles, their culture and their triumphs instead of trying to change them. It could have been just meeting people from another nation and learning that people are basically the same despite the varied ideologies and political views. If this was done, the Rotary ished its Foundation then accomplished goal international understanding.

TO BE CONTINUED ...

After establishing the first Rotary Club in Chican, Paul wanted to expand the concot of Rotary:

It was disappointing to me but most of my fellow Chicago Rotarians refused to be stampeded into my "Rotary Around the World" fantasy. Nothing is more disconcerting than the blank look of friends to whom one's hopes are unintelligible. I soon learned that the best way to get things done was to do them myself...

So I proceeded to address myself to the task of getting Rotary clubs started in cities throughout the United States. In this work circumstances required that the effort be made by correspondence. My classmates in the three universities, Vermont, Princeton, and Iowa, and friends I had made in my five years of vagabondage were my natural recourse.

WHY THE ROTARY FOUNDATION (PART 2)

What other programs does the Foundation have besides the educational programs?

Foundation seven humanitarian programs: PolioPlus, Health, Hunger & Humanity (3-H) Grants, Matching Grants, Grants for Rotary Volunteers, Carl P. Miller Discovery Grants, Rotary Grants for University Teachers to Serve in Developing Countries & Rotary Peace Programs.

We must be talking major bucks with all these programs.

The total fund balances at 6/30/92 were approximately \$340 million. Contributions for 1991-92 were \$50.3 million.

I assume most of those contributions came from the U.S.?

No. 39% came from Asia, with the US & Canada a close second with 36%.

Where does most of the money go?

1991-92, 48% was PolioPlus, and 31% on scholarships.

Who gets to decide how the money is spent - Robert Barth?

PolioPlus expenditures come from a restricted PolioPlus fund. Of the unrestricted funds, 60% of

expenditures are determined by the individual districts credited with Under the new the contributions. SHARE system, each district "shops" for the programs it wishes to fund. It may buy scholarships, additional GSE teams, contribute to 3-H grants, etc.

I'd like to be a Paul Harris Fellow but \$1000 is a little steep for me right now.

Our club has a large credit balance with the Foundation and will match your contribution so that you can become a Paul Harris Fellow with a \$500 contribution.

Do I have to give the \$500 all at once?

No; you can start out as a Paul Harris Sustaining Member by contributing a minimum of \$100 and stating your intention to become a Harris Fellow.

After I become a Paul Harris Fellow, that's it, right - I'll be done giving to the Foundation?

We hope not. The Foundation's work is ongoing and each year many worthy projects go unfunded due to lack of available funds. After becoming a Paul Harris Fellow yourself, you can make contributions to have your loved ones recognized as Paul Harris Fellows as well. Or you can become a Multiple Fellow and receive a lapel pin fitted with one blue stone for each additional \$1000 contribution, up to 5 stones.

hear Bill Kourakos is a Benefactor. What does that mean?

Benefactor is anyone who notified the Foundation that he/she has made provision in his or her will or estate plan for the Rotary Foundation, or who has made an outright gift of \$1000 or more to the Foundation's Endowment Fund.

There are lots of asking me for money organizations this time of Why should I choose contribute to the Rotary Foundation?

That's a good question but I'm not going to answer it. I hope each of us has enough information to thoughtfully answer this question for ourselves.

CHAPTER 8 - ROTARY SPREADS

The long years passed before the first victory was scored. To find the right man to organize a Rotary clu in a given city was not easy. Manuel Munoz proved to be the right man to carry the message to San Francisco. He had been my roommate in the Del Prado Hotel in Chicago and was fairly well versed While on a business trip to San Francisco, rebuilding after its earthquake and fire, Munoz interested Homer Wood, a lawyer, and put him into correspondence with me. The result was that in November, 1908 we had our second Rotary club. As if that were not enough, alert San Franciscans organized Rotary club number three in Oakland, club number four in Seattle, and club number five in Los Angeles. York and Boston were next and other cities followed. doubting Thomases were won over and joined extension work.

And so it went on from city to city and eventually from country to country and my five years of vagabondage served me in good stead. After all, I was only leading Rotary over trails I had already blazed.

Since Mike McGovern had to forego the Dec. I meeting to attend a meeting on toilets, he might be interested in this ins. nent in the life of Rotary:

Even before there was a second club, realizing the importance of community service, I persuaded the Chicago Rotary Club to initiate the establishment of public comfort stations in the city of Chicago, inviting the city administration and every civic organization in the city to join our club in the undertaking. It is possible that some more attractive objective might have been chosen for our first venture, but it would be difficult to have found one which would have stirred up more agitation. Two formidable forces rose up against us; one was the Chicago Association of Brewers which contended that every one of Chicago's six thousand saloons offered public comfort conveniences for men. The proponents of the measure nevertheless persisted that men ought not to have to buy a glass of beer nor women have to buy merchandise to make use of toilet facilities. The stations were established.
