GAN-BEI IN TAIPEI

Rotarians from around the globe traveled last month to Taipei, Republic of China. I enjoyed the conference along with RID Dan and Shirley Mooers. A major highlight of the convention was the introduction of new directors including Dan. Then President -Elect of RI Bill Huntley slipped up slightly mentioning Dan's club. He referred to us as the South Portland- Cape...Cape Elizabeth Rotary Club. Cape Elizabeth apparently needed just a little more attention than South Portland.

A vivid memory was the visit of Percy Chu, the 96 year old former president of the Shanghai, a club which was forced to be disbanded. Chu spoke energetically of meeting Paul Harris and indicated that he is probably the only living Asian who met Paul Harris. Another interesting plenary session speaker was a Swiss astronaut who flew on the Hubble telescope correction mission. The President of Taiwan gave a speech in Mandarin which was little understood by the 3,000 Americans present among the 31,000 total.

Home hospitality was provided in hotel banquet areas by Taipei area clubs. My dinner was about twelve courses, ten of which were fish. The club was very generous with the meal and with gifts. I also had an opportunity for home hospitality staying four nights with a PDG and his wife in Hong Kong. They were fascinating people and have a beautiful home overlooking the Hong Kong skyline and Victoria Harbor.

Many have asked if I would go again. Taipei is a polluted, traffic filled, humid, hot, poorly planned community with the rudest drivers anywhere. If it were not for the Rotary sessions and hospitality, the visit would have been quite boring. Hong Kong and Beijing were fascinating and were good to see, but once seen is probably enough.

One last observation after having met many past presidents of RI at the hotel and other Rotary notables is that the real strength of Rotary is at the local level. The Rotary leaders provide exceptional leadership and support, but it is the fried dough, the Christmas trees, the scholarships, the work projects, and the work done by individual members that make Rotary meaningful. Visiting the RI Convention made me proud of all that the SP-CE club does and to appreciate the environment that we live in. If others visit the Convention in the future, I am sure you will be impressed, but you will also have a much greater awareness of what is truly meant by "think globally, act locally,"


LOBSTER BAKE!



RISING FLOOD WATERS IN GEORGIA INSPIRE ROTARY RELIEF EFFORTS

Since July 4, Tropical Storm Alberto - being called the worst natural disaster ever to hit the state of Georgia - has left some parts of the state's southern region under 20 feet of water. The severe flooding has caused at least 28 deaths, destroyed some 300,000 acres of cropland, and forced thousands to evacuate their homes and communities. Among the first groups to respond to the devastation were local Rotarians. RI District 6900 - the hardest hit of Georgia's 3 Rotary districts - is heading relief efforts for its area as well as for Districts 6910 and 6920. Barry Smith, governor-nominee for District 6900, reported that district members have formed a disaster relief committee and set up a fund for flood victims.

"Right away we received calls from Rotarians in Florida District 6990 who had organized relief efforts in the wake of Hurricane Andrew," Smith told News Basket. "They offered us not only a monetary contribution and a truckload of supplies, but also helpful pointers and guidelines based on their own experience with the hurricane." The district also received a \$10,000 donation from Southern California District 5290, which endured a disaster of its own when it was rocked by a massive earthquake last January. In addition, Smith reported other offers of help from Rotarians in several southern states.

When District 6900 Rotarians received word that ice was needed in one flooded area and sleeping cots in another, they made a few phone calls and promptly produced the items needed. Smith said when he was asked by one of the recipients, "How did you manage to do this so quickly?" he replied, "That's the power of Rotary."

ANGUS KING

July 27th meeting

Lloyd Knight introduced Angus King and, despite your editor's unswerving support of Angus, I will try to report objectively on his comments: (see photo p. 2)

Maine is 47th in the nation's economy and 48th in value-added per worker. Obstacles to improving business are (1) one of the worst worker's comp systems, (2) one of the nation's highest total taxes, and (3) a cumbersome regulatory process.

Maine has no long-range plan. We must add value to our natural resources sales ("No fish should leave Maine with its head on."); we must increase exports and use our great location; we must bring in telecommunications businesses; we must do better marketing of tourism. King also feels we need honest government to tell us the truth, e.g. that Maine is broke and has about \$100 Million in unpaid bills, etc..

He says 50% of the Legislature will be new in Nov. and King feels he can work with them to create change. "We have a professional political class that only preserves its own jobs and only does short-term thinking. It's time for a true public servant," he says.

King is against all casinos and feels the loss of Loring can only be solved by bringing in many small businesses.



The August 10 meeting was a Club Forum to review the club's finances and discuss plans for the following year. Highlights of the discussion follow.

<u>Xalapa</u> - An additional \$2700 was allocated to this restricted fund, making over \$20,000 (with matching grant) available for the project. Bob Levasseur reported that if we cannot get assistance on the Mexican end in the upcoming year we will look for another project to receive the money.

Miscellaneous Assistance - This year's budget allocates \$4500 for miscellaneous assistance. This is primarily for small requests that the Board receives from the community. Any club members who are aware of appropriate projects to receive this assistance are welcome to make suggestions to the Board.

New Programs - The budget contains three new expenditure items:

 \$2500 assistance for a Fort Williams walking tour.

\$5000 to establish a scholarship fund, and

3. \$750 to sponsor one of the monthly activities for all youth exchange students in the district.

In summarizing the budget, Frank noted that over 1/2 of the proposed expenditures are directed towards youth.

Other Project Plans - In the Community Service area it was noted that there are still opportunities to work on the Great Pond trail. In the Vocational arena Agnes reported plans to update the vocational resources list for students.

Help for Phil Dube - Although it seems just the other day that the Quebec students were here (May actually), Phil is already making contacts to plan next year's exchanges. Phil has single-handedly coordinated this project every year and has it down to a well-oiled machine. It's time now for someone else to lend a hand to Phil. The exchanges take place in March (up there) and May (down here). Please let Phil or Nancy know if you would be interested in easing the burden on Phil.

Membership & Attendance - Alecdiscussed the importance of all members contributing to increased membership.

The feasibility of changing the day and/or time of meetings was also discussed.

Rotary Youth Exchange - Our club will not be hosting or sending an exchange student for the 94-95 year. However it is time to think about the 95-96 year already. To participate in the 95-96 exchange, a student must be a high school student with good character and academic performance, and be between 15 1/2 and 18 1/2 on July 1, 1995. Children of Rotarians and non-Rotarians are equally eligible to participate. If you know of an eligible candidate who would be interested and/or if you are interested in hosting a foreign student for part of the year, please contact Nancy or Frank.

'We can make a difference...that's all that matters.' The goods collected by District 7780 are scheduled to be shipped to Tanzania on Sept.

MORE ON MEMBERSHIP

Now that we've gone through who can be candidates for membership, let's cover how to propose a member, based on the club's new procedures. The new procedures are designed to prevent any potential embarrassment or bad feelings in the event that a proposed member might be "blackballed."

- *A club member fills out a membership proposal card with very basic information about the proposed member.
- *The Board reviews the proposal and notifies the entire club membership, through a personal letter from the club president, of the pending proposal.
- *Club members have ten days to make any objections to the Board in writing, giving a reason for the objection.
- *After the ten-day period the Board votes on the proposal. If a majority favors the proposal, the proposer is notified.
- *The proposer discusses Rotary with the proposed member and invites him/her to attend a club meeting. (The club pays for the guest's meal.)
- *The proposed member is informed about the purposes of Rotary and the privileges and responsibilities of membership. He or she is then invited to join the club.

Note that with this new procedure there will probably be many people who will be approved for membership but who turn out not to be interested in Rotary. That's ok and that's why we need to propose lots of potential members. Let's each come up with 3 names of people who might be interested. (Len King already has!)

He has served Rotary International as district governor, district Rotary information institute counselor, member and chairman of numerous committees, Rotary Foundation trustee and director, and aide to the president of Rotary International. He was chairman of both the Rotary International PolioPlus Campaign Committee for the U.S.A. and the 1991 Mexico City International Convention Committee. Herb has received both the Citation of Meritorious Service and the Distinguished Service Award for his service to The Rotary Foundation. His volunteer work for Rotary has brought him awards from the governments of Colombia and the Philippines. He has achieved more than 40 years of perfect attendance in Rotary.

Herb is chairman of the Board of Checkers Drive-In Restaurants, Inc., a publicly-held corporation with more than 450 restaurants and some 25,000 employees in 20 states. For




