PROGRAM

Our guest speaker was Anne Schink of Youth Build Portland. Youth Build is a national group founded by Dorothy Stoneman in Harlem that "educates" troubled youth through a mixture of conventional education and construction work. In Portland, approximately 25 students are accepted into the 9 month program each year and are expected to obtain a G.E.D. and learn a trade. Most of the student come from broken homes or have substance abuse problems. The program is rigorous, alternating between a week of school and a week rehabbing low income housing in the Portland West neighborhoods. The program is currently subsidized by HUD but the Group is looking for more community involvement. Anne feels that success in a program of this type is measured not by attainment of material things but rather by avoidance...avoidance of jail time...avoidance of substance abuse...avoidance of a drain on the slim social service revenues. Anne, whose father was a rotarian, felt lucky to speak before a group of Rotarians. With her commitment to such a worthy cause, we are truly lucky to have her as our guest.

PROGRAM

After two speakers cancelled on him, Alec Livingston decided to give an impromptu classification talk on long-term care insurance. The topic was not only timely but of vital importance to all of us as the cost of health care skyrockets. Here are some of the highlights: Forty percent of our national budget goes to pay Medicare/Medicaid/ Social Security costs, but Medicare only pays for 100 days in a facility. The source of payment for nursing home costs are equally staggering:

- \$28.4 billion is paid annually by Medicaid
- \$25.8 billion is paid by residents or their families
- Only \$600 million is paid by private insurance

Since insurance is available to protect against this uncertainty that we all will most certainly face, we may want to consider it because the other two options may not be available to each of us. Alec noted that premiums can be very reasonable but the rates increase starting with people in their early 60's - If this is something you think you will need, it may make economic sense to purchase before turning 60. Alec noted that there are different types of policies including policies for those needing in-home care and Alec urged everyone to speak with their own personal agent for more information. **Thank you, Alec for a very informative and timely talk.**

PROGRAM

The Program, introduced by **David Lourie**, was done by **Trudy McNaughtly** on International Tourism, especially in Eastern Europe. Trudy, who spent nine years with the Portland Convention and Visitors Bureau, views tourism as a socioeconomic stimulus to many countries. She pointed out that tourism is the number one business in the world and is often times depended on by many developing countries for stability. In addition, tourism helps to promote culture and heritage as well as creating pride in community. If you consider how many times you visit the various tourist attractions in the Portland area, you realize that the local population does not support the places that draw tourists rather it is the influx of dollars from away that helps sustain the Longfellow House, the Victorian Mansion and other public facilities like them. Tourism is also a vehicle for learning and understanding other cultures, meeting people and for sharing values and a sense of community. Trudy very poignantly pointed out that it is very difficult to bomb a country where you have visited the cafe and know some of the people. She also pointed out that tourism for many areas assists the country in stabilizing its economy and that tourism can provide a quick injection of cash to an economy that needs to retool its factories and produce a different product. The balance of the Trudy's talk was a collection of anecdotes from her travels to Eastern Europe. Her visits included a trip to a former Communist Party compound in Hungary. She gave poignant descriptions of the cities of Budapest and Warsaw, Poland as well as side trips to Estonia and Slovakia. The most crucial point made was that while these are not considered exotic locations, the culture and surroundings in some of these countries surprise the potential visitor. In addition, the stark differences in the cultures in some of these locations from our own are very evident. Even though they exist in 1997, they are a throw back to pre-World War II cultures with pockets of modern technology. Many things we take for granted such as ownership of titled property is often difficult to prove in these countries or have ravaged records and properties literally taken from people in times of war have no clear ownership.

Trudy left us with three points that should be evaluated in considering tourism to Eastern Europe:

1. While Eastern Europe has been developing over the last 50 years, it has been totally devoid of competition. This has created a system of bureaucracy which is unfathomable to us and requires the countries to rethink their entire systems of commerce.
2. The technology, especially the onset of faxes and e-mail, has already changed the way the world works and Eastern Europe is no exception and as more and more contact with the outside world is evident, they too will change and accept technology and the benefits it offers;
3. No matter what the location or the living conditions, people are the same everywhere.

Thank you Trudy for a very enlightening evening.

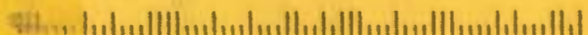

PROGRAM

The speaker this evening was **Ken Filliter**, a director of **Big Brothers/Big Sisters** and **Mick Maher's** boss. Ken, who works for National Semiconductor, was introduced by Mick and "threatened" to tell us various anecdotes about Mick. We probably should have asked Ken about Mick's "goals and objectives".

When he is not busy with National Semiconductor, Ken's passion is the Big Brothers/Big Sisters organization of Greater Portland. The organization, which has had some difficulty staying viable in the past, has apparently broadened its funding base and is now viewed as a viable non-profit entity. The organization serves "at risk kids" in the Portland area. At risk is defined as those kids coming from single parent households. In Cumberland County alone there are 8,000 such kids. The reason they are considered at risk is that they are statically more likely to drop out of school or appear in court than kids from dual parent households.

The organization tries to match a kid with a responsible adult who has a similar personalities and tastes. The organization requires nothing specific of the BIG other than a desire to spend several hours a month doing what you typically do for leisure time activities but including a LITTLE in those activities. Statistics show that the program works on all levels by improving the self-esteem of the LITTLE and usually means that the LITTLE performs better in school and stays out of trouble. A very valuable fringe benefit is that the self-esteem of the BIG also rises significantly. The Portland chapter currently has 70 matches of adults and children (both males and females).

The organization is constantly looking for new adults to serve as BIGS for young boys and girls. The process requires some orientation and significant screening but requires no special skills except devotion for the LITTLE. The time spent is basically included in your general leisure time. Matches are made by case workers and are monitored closely for continuing synergy. The process is very enlightening for all participants and should be seriously considered by anyone wanting to offer a kid a chance.

In addition, the organization has many fund raisers including **Bowling for Kid's Sake** which will take place on April 5, 1997. For more information, contact Big Brothers/Big Sisters at 773-KIDS. Thank you Ken for a most interesting talk.

Sharon Roberts spoke on the good work that Blue Cross Blue Shield does as a corporate citizen of Maine. Blue Cross is the insurer for over 480,000 Mainers and remains as the insurer of last resort where anyone can obtain insurance. They have donated \$350,000 to provide immunizations for Maine children. They also assist their home office communities with payments in lieu of taxes. She indicated that the Maine Partners Health Care Program will serve to provide Mainers additional choices for health care coverage. Doctors will have more say in determining policies for coverages. Jobs are likely to stay in Maine instead of to out of state providers such as NYLCare and the Harvard and Tufts Medical Plans. Thank you Sherry for an interesting presentation.

Mr. Buckley talked about the alliance between BC/BS and Maine Med. He said two myths were that they were merging ("they are not"), and that everyone is automatically in the plan ("there are many options").

Mercy Hospital, which was not originally included in the alliance, had several concerns. Among those was that the largest insurer and the largest provider in Maine shouldn't be allowed to dictate medical care. "That would have been poor public policy," Buckley said. He added that Mercy would have lost an estimated 66 percent of its business. Mercy is about 1/3 the size of Maine Med.

"Managed care is now an accepted concept," he says, "and it has proven to be a way to control costs. But the trade-off is loss of choice. Managed care is coming, however, whether we like it or not."

Mercy is now, as news reports have indicated, included in the alliance -- "and we're pleased," says Buckley.

He adds, "Maine Med is a wonderful hospital and we're blessed to have two excellent hospitals to serve our community. The competition is good."

MORE FACTS ABOUT ORGAN DONATION
20 FACTS ABOUT ORGAN DONATION AND TRANSPLANTATION

1. More than 40,000 U.S. patients are currently waiting for an organ transplant; more than 2,000 new patients are added to the waiting list each month.
2. Every day, about 8 to 9 people die while waiting for a transplant of a vital organ, such as a heart, liver, kidney, pancreas, lung or bone marrow.
3. In 1994, about 11 percent of the patients on the list for heart transplants died while waiting because of the lack of available organs.
4. About 12 percent of the patients currently waiting for liver transplants are young people under 18 years of age.
5. Acceptable organ donors can range in age from newborn to 65 years or more.
6. Acceptable organ donors are those who are "brain dead" (brain function has ceased permanently) but whose heart and lung continue to function with the use of artificial life supports. Brain dead is a legal definition of death.
7. An estimated 10,000 to 14,000 people who die each year meet the criteria for organ donation, but less than half of that number become actual organ donors.
8. Vital organs may be recovered and transported thousands of miles to a transplant center for transplantation. This is due, in part, to advances in preservation techniques.
9. Donor organs are matched to waiting recipients by a national computer registry, called the National Organ Procurement and Transplantation Network (OPTN). This computer registry is operated by an organization known as the United Network for Organ Sharing (UNOS), which is located in Richmond, Virginia.
10. Currently there are 54 organ procurement organizations (OPOs) across the country, which provide organ procurement services to some 279 transplant centers.
11. By federal mandate, all states must have some form of "Required Request" legislation, which requires hospitals within the state to set up a protocol for offering the next-of-kin of someone who has died the option of donating the organs and tissues of the deceased.
12. By signing a Uniform Donor Card, an individual indicates his or her wish to be a donor. However, at the time of death, the person's next-of-kin will still be asked to sign a consent form for donation. It is important for people who wish to be organ and tissue donors to tell their families about this decision so that their wish will be honored at the time of death. It is estimated that about 35% of potential donors are never utilized because family members refuse to give consent.
13. All costs related to the donation of organs and tissues are paid for by the donor program. Rarely a family has received a bill by mistake. If this happens, families should contact the hospital or procurement agency immediately.
14. There were 5,100 cadaver donors in the U.S. in 1994, which represented a small increase over the total of 4,860 in 1993. Living donors increased from 2,803 in 1993 to 2,874 in 1994.
15. Donor organs and tissues are removed surgically, and the donor's body is closed, as in any surgery. There is no deformation of the body and open casket funerals are still possible.
16. Organ donation has been low among minority groups. Only 585 African-Americans and 411 Hispanic-Americans donated organs in 1994; this is in sharp contrast to the 3,962 Caucasian-Americans who donated organs in 1994.
17. Organ transplant recipients are also selected on the basis of medical urgency as well as compatibility of body size and blood chemistries and not race, sex or creed.
18. The success rates of all types of organ and tissue transplants have improved due to advances in surgical technique, organ preservation and the development of more effective drugs to prevent rejection.
19. About 80 percent of the kidneys transplanted from cadavers (persons who died recently) are still functioning well at one year after surgery. The results are even better for kidneys transplanted from living related donors because of more closely matched organs. One year after surgery, 93 percent of these kidneys were still functioning well.
20. Of the single kidney transplants performed in 1994, 2,980 were from living donors and 7,642 were from cadaver donors. Another 746 kidneys were transplanted in combination with pancreas transplants, for a total of 11,368 kidney transplants.

Steve Obremski, Executive Director of the Maine Center for the Blind and Visually Impaired -- and his guide dog Promise -- told us of the activities of his organization.

The MCBVI was begun in 1905 (same year as Rotary) and one of the original board members was Joshua Chamberlain. They began by making brooms and mattresses.

Today, the Center offers rehabilitation services where people learn needed skills and how to use their other senses more effectively. The group also works with people in their homes (since the majority of blind are now over 55).

The Center teaches computer skills in its technology program so people can use the speech output capabilities of computers. Some assembly work is done for local manufacturers. And they make and sell various products, including some contracted to the government.

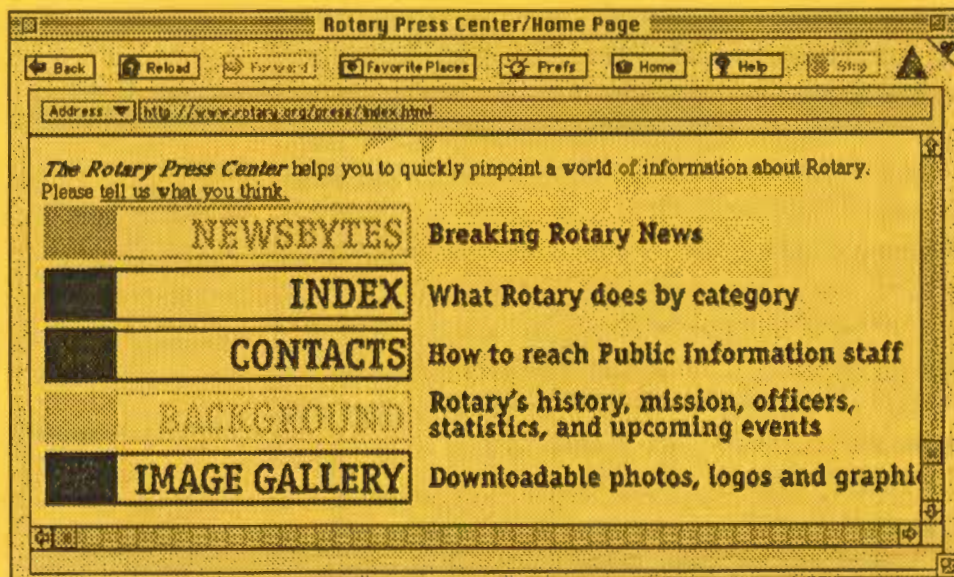

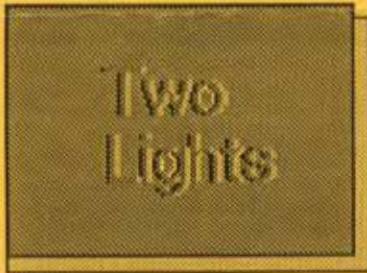

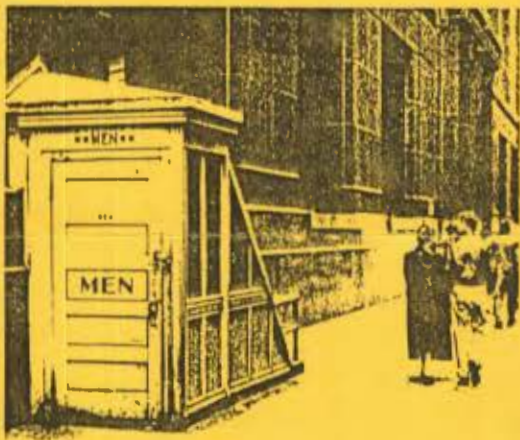

Donna represents RoadRunner, a brand-new high speed digital on-line service from Time Warner Cable.

You can now get on-line service -- including Internet access -- without using a phone line. New cable lines (the same ones you use to see cable TV) have been installed in the Portland area. They have a greater capacity and can operate both your TV and this new on-line service. Your cable TV service is not affected when you use the on-line service; it just runs through the same cable simultaneously.

Using a new cable modem technology, the service provides much faster download times without tying up phone lines. It provides an Internet link at high speed, e-mail services, and unlimited access. Donna tells us it is much faster than current phone modem service.

Portland is the 4th city in the country to have this system, so we are at the cutting edge.

Donna was kind enough to set up all the equipment and give us an actual demonstration of the new system. We even saw the web sites of a couple of Rotary members!
