## THIS WEEK'S MEETING APRIL 7, 1999 THF PROGRAM

Ann Cranshaw of the Cape Community Coalition was introduced by Nancy. Ann explained that the organization of youth and adults seeking to create a resilient community by promoting health, well-being and mutual respect." Funding for the coalition comes primarily from Title 4. One of the initial programs of the Coalition was an awareness program on inhalant abuse, and the program received considerable publicity.

However the Coalition realized that it was focusing too much on negative behavior. Joining up the "Search Institute" of Minneapolis, the Coalition now focuses on the 40 "assets" that all kids need - the "building blocks for life."

Liz Weaver of the Coalition explained that the 40 "assets", which are based on community research conducted by the Search Institute, are such simple things as "having someone who will say "NO"," "having someone who cares for a child," or "taking time for activities with kids."

John Cranshaw (Ann's son), a junior at Cape High, spoke briefly about getting people involved. He also expressed the idea that little

things, like saying "Hi" to a young person on the street helps in building "assets."



# Rotary History Dignifying an Occupation

Paul Harris, the founder of Rotary, was a lawyer. Jealous for the honor of his profession, , he took an active part in the work of legal associations - local, state, national and international. In those days of 1905, there was the gulf of a long tradition between members of the learned professions and those engaged in trade. Paul Harris felt deeply a need to bridge that gulf - to rescue the professional man from the isolation that was alternatively lonesome and irritating - to dignify the occupation of tradesman with zeal for its honor.

So to the first meting in Chicago of the first Rotary club he invited a coal dealer, a tailor, and a mining engineer.

Men of different vocations, trades and professions formed the first Rotary club. Vocation was the principle of selection at the beginning, and has remained the distinguishing core of Rotary ever since.

Let it not be thought, however, that the implications of this principle have remained unchanged through the years. The impact of practical experience on earnest men such as Arthur Frederick Sheldon stimulated a continuing development. An early member of the Rotary club, Sheldon established a school of salesmanship based on the idea that successful salesmanship depends on rendering service and that no transaction is justified unless both parties benefit. He gave Rotary the slogan, "He profits most who serves best."

## THIS WEEK'S MEETING APRIL 14, 1999 HE PROGRAM

Steve Willis, State Fire Administrator, Maine Fire Training & Education, was introduced by Jeff Gabrielson. Steve outlined the purpose and goals of his agency, and shared with us the development of his strategic plan. Reminding us that there are "only so many chances to do things right," he pointed out that his agencies goal is "to help make Maine's firefighters and citizens safer. The USA and Maine, in the industrialized world, is the most dangerous in terms of fire hazards. We simply are not as cautious and cognizant of fire prevention as other countries.

It was startling to learn that there are towns in Maine that cannot afford to heat their fire barns in the winter so they have to drain of the water from the pumpers and, in the event of a fire, take the time to fill the tank before battling the blaze. Steve also shared with us the fact that firefighters have a life expectancy 10 years less than the general population.

In Maine there are about 12,000 firefighters, of which 11,000 are volunteers. Only 4 cities have a totally full time fire department, 50 have one full time,

paid firefighter and 450 are all volunteer. Cape Elizabeth Fire Chief Phil McGoldrick was Jeff's guest at the meeting.

During questioning after the meeting, both Steve and Phil reminded us that you should replace all smoke detectors every 10 years and batteries every years.

Thanks, Jeff, for an interesting and informative program.

Dear Fellow Rotarians

Last week I completed my goal of making up at every club in District 7780 during this Rotary year. It has been an interesting experienced and I will now know where to find each club meeting place when I return after July 1<sup>st</sup>, to begin the process anew.

For those who are curious about statistics, the district now has 39 clubs. The most popular meeting time Tuesday morning with eight clubs, followed by Thursday morning with six clubs. A total of 21 clubs meet in the morning, 15 at lunch with four each on Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday. Three clubs meeting the evening: Brunswick Coastal, Boothbay Harbor and this club. The least popular weekday is Friday when only three clubs meet.

The meeting locations include restaurants, private clubs, church halls, a Rotary building, the basement of a nuclear power plant and one golf course. Most are relatively easy to find, but I discovered the district directory should have more information on meeting location addresses.

Most of the clubs now have buffet meals and this is especially true with the breakfast clubs. The programs are as varied as the clubs themselves. The last club I made up at had a local resident, Maine humorist Tim Sample, as their weekly program. Happy dollars or fines are collected in nearly all clubs, but the dollars are usually collected at the tables by a sergeant-at-arms. The music is varied and is definitely better where there is accompaniment. All clubs have an invocation or a moment of silence and nearly all saluted the flag. ITO continued] Mike

# Rotary History COMMUNITY SERVICE The Heartbeat of Rotary

**Community Service** has been called the heartbeat of Rotary. It carries out the third part of the Object of Rotary, which encourages Rotarians to apply the Ideal of Service to their own neighborhoods.


Rotary's first Community Service project took place in 1907, when Paul Harris led a campaign to have a public comfort station installed at the city hall in Chicago, Illinois. The campaign was successful in spite of opposition from saloons and department stores that provided these facilities to attract customers.

As the years passed, club members began increasingly to imporve their surroundings in a spirit of service. For example, in the early days of the automobile age, Rotarians in San Jose, California, in just one afternoon in 1915, placed more than 1,000 identifying street signs at the city's intersections.

The typical project in Rotary's second decade was the Sunshine Camp for 60 physically disabled children on the shores of Lake Ontario near Rochester, New York. The members of the Rotary Club of Rochester founded and continue to maintain the camp, which is staffed with cooks, nurses, teachers, and playground instructors. At the same time, in Tamaulipas, Mexico, Tampico club members established their city's first fire station, and in Canada, Rotarians of Price Rupert, British Columbia, raised funds to help complete the nurses' home at the local hospital.

These early Rotarians were beginning to shape the characteristics and principles of the third Avenue of Service. Following World War II, scores of clubs from Guam to Belgium sprang out of war's rubble to reestablish themselves and their communities, and Community Service soon became the widest and most visible Avenue of Service.



The big move, of course, came when Charles Shipman Payson, wanting a permanent home for his collection of Winslow Homers, donated \$11 million to build a new museum which, along with a government grant, provided most of the money for the construction. The museum operates on an annual budget of \$2.6 million.

Vera Lagomarsino (the "Commandant") is the museum's Education Coordinator & Tour Director, who has to control the 1300 students who visit the museum. Under her 10 year tenure, many new programs have been introduced. More children in Maine are introduced to art at the museum than any other institution in Maine. Also of note are the "Evenings for Educators" at the museum, and the free admission on Friday evening.

Unfortunately, only 16 club members were present to hear an excellent program as part of President Nancy's efforts to bring culture to our club.

Dear Fellow Rotarians

Last week I wrote about some of my experiences making up at the 39 clubs throughout District 7780. This week, I am continuing with my observations on programs that I saw at the meetings.

Clubs plan their programs in a number of ways. Many clubs have a program chairman who arranges all of the programs for a set period of time ranging from a month to the full Rotary year. While our club has a program chair whe coordinates programming, each member responsible for obtaining programs. Which system a particular club uses did not appear to have an effect on the programs.

The caliber of speakers met the full range of poor to exceptional. Some clubs asked a member to speak as a last minute substitute and it was obvious that there had been no preparation. Other speakers were clearly well prepared and tried to tailor their speech to the audience.

It is important for speakers to know the length of time that is expected of them and some minor dos and don'ts of speaking. There needs to be communication on what audio visual resources are needed. Will there be a podium? Who will supply an overhead projector? Is there a place to properly present a PowerPoint presentation?

The introductions of speakers also ran the gamut. I was most impressed with clubs that presented a 90 second biography of the speaker indicating professional background and personal issues such as where they live and to what associations they belong. Some speakers were warmly applauded when introduced. Others received no applause. Speakers appeared to appreciate a proper introduction apwelcoming applause. [To be continued.]

### Rotary History Service Above Self "We Need Each Other"

Down in Singapore there lived the 3rd Vice-President of Rotary International [1966-67] and many of you would know him: Doctor Arthur Theyathasan, Born in Cevlon, he had lived most of his life in Singapore. A medical doctor, his father was a Methodist minister. He was a man of great statute, of great service, beloved and respected in Rotary world-wide. We were there at an inter-city meeting at Singapore [March 15, 1967]. The President of the Republic was with us and a very distinguished company gathered there. I had spoken, and Arthur had spoken, and we had together cut a Rotary birthday cake. Arthur was sitting between Alice and his wife. Gnana, and we were in the midst of a ten-course Chinese dinner, and Arthur's head just slowly drooped to his chest, and he was gone - at fifty-three years of age, seemingly of great promise. . . . Well this deeply sobered us, of course. We went on up to Malaysia and then returned to Singapore and spoke at his funeral service. And there was a great outpouring in that city for this lost and beloved man.

I think we should face ourselves soberly with this inevitable exit from mortality for all of us. This dramatized it for us, and we shall never forget it. And the summons that sometime will come to each of us, I think will be of this nature. The Maker of us all and the Father of us all will in some sense say: "Come now, and come just as you are." There won't be time to correct the past, to do much about the undone things, to change much the nature of us within our hearts and inside ourselves. The readiness is the important lesson of this occurrence. "Come just as you are and come now."

I think that whatever we ought to be, we ought to be becoming; and whatever we ought to be doing, we ought to be doing. We ought to be about our business. I feel in Rotary that we may well rededicate ourselves to a deeper – not only conviction – but a proof of that conviction. Carlyle, I believe it was, who said: "Conviction is worthless unless it is converted into conduct." I plead with Rotarians everywhere, and you associated with them, for a rededication to "Service Above Self."

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

#### PROGRAMS OF ROTARY INTERNATIONAL Community Service Programs

Rotary Community Service Corps (RCSC): Sponsored by a Rotary club. RCSC's are organized in rural or urban communities to promote grass-roots, self-help development projects; develop local leadership abilities; maximize local resources; and use appropriate cost-efficient technology.

Functional Literacy: An emphasis on the right of each individual to have the reading and writing skills necessary to participate fully and with dignity in all aspects of community life. Rotarians are encouraged to assess needs in their communities for development of literacy programs and initiate literacy projects as appropriate.

Concern for the Aging: Rotary clubs are encouraged to undertake community service projects that respond to the social, physical, vocational, and educational needs of senior citizens. Concern for the Aging projects incorporate senior citizens into community activities and help eliminate generational barriers.

Preserve Planet Earth: A program to promote balanced development - the process economic and social development that meets the needs of the present without compromising the ability of future generations to meet their own needs - must be achieved. Rotary clubs are encouraged to increase ecological and environmental awareness in their homes, communities, and throughout the world.

Drug Abuse Prevention: An emphasis through which Rotary clubs examine the drug abuse situation in their communities and identify resources for addressing these problems.

Hunger: An area of activity which encourages Rotary clubs to undertake projects to alleviate starvation and death caused by hunger; substantially reduce malnutrition and mortality among children; tangibly reduce chronic hunger; and eliminate major diseases resulting from inadequate nutrition

The Famous (formerly San Diego) Chicken pulls in a cool \$2 mil a year; the Dogs have drawn over 2 million fans in its five years in Portland, one of the smallest baseball markets; the Dogs have had an average attendance at 90% of capacity per game, 12<sup>th</sup> best in the more than 250 baseball markets; only 5% of minor league players make it to the big leagues; front office personal work harder in the winter than they do in the summer, doing sales, marketing, promotion for their entertainment business.

John obviously enjoys his work, never knowing what he will be asked to do when he arrives at the ball park. He has done everything from working on the tarp crew to being a pig hunter. He also sees and gets to know the rising stars in baseball when they earn \$1,800 a month. He even gets to an occasional World Series.

Dear Fellow Rotarians:

One of the most interesting ideas I have heard as I have traveled the district is the club that once a month tries to obtain an absolutely stellar program. While the program every week should be enriching and thoughtful, a club could aim for a knockout meeting, say on the first meeting of each month.

A Rotary club speaker need not be famous, but the person should provide provocative comments or usefu' information. A "speaker's committee could meet each month and identify a subject area or speaker that would likely be of much interest the following month. The committee would help to ensure diversity among the programs. The programs could be extensively promoted within the club as an opportunity to bring in prospective members. Over time, programs every week might get stronger as attendance and membership would increase thus giving the Rotary club credibility as an important public forum.

For example, I think some of the following programs might be interesting and timely: a panel of students to explain their views on whether or not a Littleton, Colorado could happen here; What is going on with the stock market? What will be the effect of the UNUM-Provident merger for this region? Senator Susan Collins on her sweepstakes and other investigations. A point/counterpoint on whether the State should buy more land; a visit to the airport to hear about new airlines, new facilities being planned, and competition from Manchester.

I could go on at length. The key point is that stimulating programs are good for membership recruitment and retention.

### Rotary History Rotary Club of South Portland - Cape Elizabeth "Charter Members"

When the Rotary Club of South Portland met for the first time on December 27, 1961, there were 21 charter members. Four of those Rotarians are still members of the club: *Richard F. Kilroy, Warren S. Simpson, Richard Yerxa and Dan Gacetta.* Two of them have perfect attendance since that first meeting.

Dick Kilroy was the first President. In 1961, Dick was the owner of the Beecher Agency, Inc., a business he had acquired in 1952. Having graduated from Boston University in 1943, Dick then graduated from the U.S. Naval Midshipman School and participated in the Normandy and Southern France missions and in the liberation of the Philippine Islands, the invasion of Okinawa and the occupation of Japan.

After the war, Dick returned to B.U., earned a Masters Degree in Administration and later a Certificate of Advance Study. After 5 years as teacher/ coach at Scarborough High School, Dick spent the next 34 years in real estate. He was active in the Portland Board of Realtors and served as President of the Maine Multiple Listing Service, Inc. He has served on numerous local and state committees, boards and commission.

Warren Simpson was the club's first Bulletin Editor and the second President of the club. He is the senior member of our club.

Warren graduated from Sanford High School and began his business career as a production and quality supervisor at the Goodall-Sanford mill. Work was interrupted by World War II, during which Warren served in the Army Air Corps. He returned to Goodall-Sanford and was employed there until the textile mill closed its doors and moved south.

Warren moved also, to South Portland, where he became the manager of Shopper's Hardware Inc. He purchased the business in 1966, and turned the managerial reins over to his son, Tom, in 1982.

Warren has served as the president and member of the Trustees of his church and the superintendent of its Sunday School. 

Over 90,000 persons, including 3,000 school children, attended PSO concerts last season.

It was interesting to learn that the PSO budget is about \$2.3 million, with about 65% coming from ticket sales. All the musicians are professionals, with 82 under contract. There will be 15 Magic of Christmas performances and no other orchestra does that.

Dear Fellow Rotarians:

Club Presidents List 99-00 Priorities

Incoming club presidents have begun to present their priorities for 1999-2000. At the District Assembly on April 24th, I was pleased to present the results of a survey of priorities that was taken at PETS in March.

More than two thirds of the clubs indicated that they need to focus on membership development and retention. Many clubs voiced concern that they are having trouble assimilating new members into Rotary. In order to assist clubs, the district will be providing area membership seminars in August and September. This will also be a focus as I meet with each club during my visits this summer.

Rotary awareness is a concern of more than half of the clubs as there is a sense that Rotary needs more prominence in our communities. I am pleased to announce that we will have a special Rotary workshop on January 29, 2000 that will give practical guidance on club public relations, new media and on handling sensitive issues.

Most clubs also plan a concentration on community projects. To assist with membership issues, Rotary awareness and community needs, we will have a district-wide community service day on October 23, 1999 when all clubs are being encouraged to undertake a hands on project to benefit their towns. This effort will also help with another priority of clubs, which is to make Rotarians out of Rotary members.

According to the survey, also receiving much emphasis this coming year will be support for the Rotary Foundation, participation in Rotapla efforts, the celebration



#### **NEW GENERATIONS PROGRAMS (con't)**

Rotary Youth Leadership Awards (RYLA) - Operates in a variety of formats worldwide to provide leadership training camps and seminars for young men and women between the ages of 14 and 30, sponsored by Rotary clubs.

Youth Exchange Program - A program which promotes international friendship by giving young men and women between the ages of 15 to 19 the opportunity to experience a long or short-term exchange (from a few days to an academic year) in a country other than their own.

#### INTERNATIONAL SERVICE PROGRAMS

World Community Service (WCS) Program - A program which encourages international cooperation to carry out projects to improve living standards and satisfy basic needs. A WCS project is a community service project which receives support from Rotarians in another country, in the form of funds, donated goods or volunteer support. Financial, material and volunteer needs are publicized through the WCS Projects Exchange, a semi-annual list of projects. Offers of donated goods and services can be publicized through the Donations-in-Kind Information Network (DIN)

Rotary Friendship Exchange - A program enabling Rotarians and their families to carry out reciprocal visits with Rotarians and their families in countries other than their own, wither on an individual basis or as a team.

#### **Public Relations of Rotary**

Historically Rotarians perpetuated a myth that Rotary should not seek publicity, but rather let our good works speak for themselves. A 1923 policy stating that "publicity should not be the primary goal of a Rotary club in selecting an activity" of community service, was frequently interpreted to mean that Rotary clubs should avoid publicity and public relations efforts. Actually, the 1923 statement further observes that "as a means of extending Rotary's influence, proper publicity should be given to a worthwhile project well carried out."

A more modern public relations philosophy was adopted in the mid-1970s which

affirms that "good publicity, favorable public relations and a positive image are desirable and essential goals for Rotary" if it is to f o s t e r understanding, appreciation and



support for its Object and programs and to broaden Rotary's service to humanity. Active public relations is vital to the success of Rotary.

A service project well carried out is considered one of the finest public relations messages of Rotary. It is essential that Rotary clubs make every effort to inform the public about their service projects which have been well performed.

As Rotary clubs and districts consider effective public relations, it is important to remember that when Rotarians think of Rotary, we think of



our motives our and noble goal world of peace. But when the world thinks of Rotary, it only can think of our actions and

service we have performed.

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

#### INTERNATIONAL SERVICE PROGRAMS (con't)

Intercountry Committees – Each committee includes Rotarians from two countries appointed by district governors, and helps encourage intercountry contacts between clubs and Rotarians in these countries in the interest of international understanding.

**Pre- or Post-Convention Homestay Program** - A program through which Rotarians living in or near the country hosting the International Convention offer home hospitality to Rotary families attending the Convention from other parts of the world.

#### THE ROTARY FOUNDATION PROGRAMS

Ambassadorial Scholarships - Scholars study in a country other than their own where they serve as "ambassadors of goodwill" for Rotary and their communities.

Group Study Exchange - Teams of non-Rotarian business and professional men and women visit each other's country for four to six weeks to study social, economic and cultural conditions and the practice of their own vocations or professions, while staying in the homes of Rotarians.

Rotary Grants for University Teachers - University and college instructors teach in developing nations on subjects of benefit to their host countries for three to ten months.


*"We Like Mike" Night* saw a good turn-out of members, spouses and guests for a fun evening honoring the incoming district governor, who was surprised.

## Duties of the **District Governor**

With Mike not having the opportunity to give his prepared speech at the meeting, it might be useful to review the provisions of the Rotary Manual of Procedure on the subject. The Rotary By-Laws provide:


The governor is the officer of RI in the district, functioning under the general control and supervision of the RI Board. In the exercise of the responsibility for district supervision the clubs in the district, the governor is charged with the particular duty of furthering the Object of Rotary and shall be personally responsible for:

- 1. Organizing new clubs;
- 2. Strengthening existing clubs;
- Promoting cordial relations 3. between clubs in the district and between the clubs and RI;
  - Planning for and presiding at the district conference and assisting the governor-elect in the planning and preparation for the presidents-elect training seminar and the district's assembly;
- 5 Visiting every club in the district:
- 6. Issuing a monthly letter to each club president and secretary in the district;
- 7. Reporting promptly to RI as may be required by the president or the RI Board; Supplying to the governorelect, prior to the date of the

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

#### **The Rotary Foundation**

Some magnificent projects grow from very small seeds. The Rotary Foundation had that sort of modest beginning.

In 1917 R.I. President Arch Klumph told the delegates to the Atlanta Convention that "it seems eminently proper that we should accept endowments for the purpose of doing good in the world." The response was polite and favorable, but the fund was slow to materialize. A year later the "Rotary Endowment Fund," as it was first labeled, received its first contribution of \$26.50 from the Rotary Club of Kansas City, which was the balance of the Kansas City Convention account following the 1918 annual meeting. Additional small amounts were annually contributed, but after six years it is reported that the endowment fund had only reached \$700. A decade later, The Rotary Foundation was formally established at the 1928 Minneapolis Convention. In the next four years the Foundation fund grew to \$50,000. In 1937 a \$2 million goal was announced for The Rotary Foundation, but these plans were cut short and abandoned with the outbreak of World War II.



In 1947, upon the death of Paul Harris, a new era opened for T h e R o t a r y F o undation as memorial gifts poured in to honor the founder of Rotary. From that time, The Rotary Foundation has been achieving its

noble objective of furthering "understanding and friendly relations between peoples of different nations." In 1954 the Foundation received for the first time a half million dollars in contributions in a single year, and in 1965 a million dollars was received.

It is staggering to imagine that from those humble beginnings, The Rotary Foundation is now receiving more than \$55 million each year for educational and humanitarian work around the world. 1998-1999 ROTARY INTERNATIONAL PRESIDENT James L. Lacy Rotary Club of Cookeville, TN

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

Matching Grants for International Humanitarian Projects -Matching funds for international, humanitarian service projects conducted by Rotary clubs and districts.

Health, Hunger and Humanity (3-H) Grants - Large scale, two to three year projects, international in scope, that emphasize self-help and improve health, alleviate hunger and enhance human and social development.



The ongoing projects included the matching grant project with Rotary Clubs from Coimbatore, India, and Salt Lake City, Utah, in which school children will benefit from the construction of new toilet facilities, new furniture for their school, and new computers. 
The orphanage project in Romania was changed due to the challenges of working in rural areas, and the logistics of follow-up. The funds earmarked for the orphanage will be utilized to help defray the costs of shipping a container of medical equipment and supplies for a new dialysis unit in Rimnicu Valcea, Romania. The Rimnicu-Valcea area has one of the highest rates of kidney disease in the world due to the high mineral content of their water, and dialysis for patients has not been available locally. With the construction of the new dialysis center, patients will no longer need to travel 3-5 hours each way to receive dialysis, and the lives of the sufferers and their care-givers will be dramatically improved. This project was coordinated through the District World Community Service Community and the International Medical Equipment Cooperative (IMEC) of New Hampshire. This non-profit organization helps communities all over the world improve the quality of their medical care through planned, structured programs.


students spend two weeks in this area, learning to focus on their similarities and not their religious differences. Thanks to Janet McLaughlin for her support of this program.

horrific events in the last several months have made us question what is happening with our youth, what is



After our four remaining Charter Members, past presidents Lloyd Knight and Sarando P. Giftos are the most senior members of our club.

Lloyd ("Cap'n") R. Knight joined the club in 1965. He served as President in 1970-71. Lloyd was born in a farmhouse in Limerick, Maine, but moved to the York County Jail when his father was elected High Sheriff of York County, and graduated from Sanford High in 1941. He went on to Bowdoin College which he finished in 2½ years, and then on to Curtis Institute of Music and the Academy of Vocal Arts in Philadelphia where he met his wife, Ellen.

Lloyd and Ellen got singing and acting jobs on Broadway, and in Philadelphia, New York, Chicago and Los Angeles. Lloyd was a winner of Arthur Godfrey's Talent Scouts, and acted on network TV's Studio One, Goodyear Playhouse, Armstrong Circle Theater, Hallmark Theater, Playhouse Ninety and in the first TV soap opera, Hawkins Falls. When Guy Gannett received his TV license in 1954, Lloyd and Ellen moved to Portland where, from 1954 to 1976, Lloyd had his own show, "Cap'n and the Kids." With the demise of local live programming )except news), Lloyd became an account executive until his retirement in 1991.

Sarando ("Sam") P. Giftos was born in Pittsfield, MA, but his parents lived in Portland before Sam was a year old. He graduated from BU in 1942, and received a Master's in Education from BU in 1956.

Sam joined the Navy where he saw duty in both World War II and the Korean Conflict, retiring from the U.S. Naval Reserve with the rank of Captain.

Following his WWII service, Sam returned to Portland and was the Chairman of Portland High School's Business Education Department from 1947 until his early retirement in 1973. Sam remained active in his accounting practice, although he slowed down a bit in 1985 when he became Rotary District Governor. Sam had served as club president in 1973-74 and nine years as District Treasurer.



Rotary Peace Program Grants - Grants which are designed to support international conferences and other activities which promote cooperation, goodwill and development.

Helping Grants - Provide 50% match to club and district funds for international humanitarian projects which will take place in a non-Rotary country or in a Rotary country where the local Rotary club cannot participate in the project due either to distance from or inaccessibility to the project site.



# THIS WEEK'S MEETING JUNE 2, 1999

Sarah Luck, director of the Portland office of the Maine Community

Foundation, spoke to the club about the Foundation and the work it does around Maine.



The MCF, formed in 1983, is a 501(c)(3) corporation that acts as a repository of charitable funds donated for use in Maine. The Foundation currently has over 400 different funds, totally more that \$60 million, for Maine's non-profit and community programs. It has awarded about \$17 million in grants, loans and scholarships to Maine people and organizations, and has seeded ideas and organizations with start-up funds, including the Maine Children's Museum, Maine Children's Alliance, WERU-FM, Portland Trails, Habitat for Humanity, Western Mountains Alliance, and the Preble Street Resource Center

Sarah indicated that in 1998, the MCF made more than 1200 grants for non-profits and scholarships totalling more that \$3.5 million. The Foundation is the third largest foundation in Maine and it is the only state-wide community foundation.

The MCF has increased and encouraged philanthropy in Maine.

Because of Bill Daviero's efforts with the Bowlathon, the club was able to donate \$4500 to Youth Alternatives.





District #7780 held a Districtwide event last weekend at Camp Sunshine in Raymond. I have a personal connection to Camp Sunshine. Several years ago my 3 year old niece Lindsey was diagnosed with Type 1 Juvenile Diabetes. This involves insulin testing at least 4 times a day, insulin injections three times daily, rigorous dietary constraints and the very real potential for serious long term health concerns. My brother's family were totally unprepared for this, and they had trouble dealing with all that it entailed. They were able to attend Camp Sunshine twice on Diabetes Week by the generosity of the South Portland Lions Club. They found that the educational programs, group discussion sessions and recreational activities helped their entire family immensely (one of the primary premises of Camp Sunshine is that serious pediatric illnesses affect the entire family, not just the affected child). They have formed friendships and medical relationships that will be long term.

I have never participated in this type of work project before (pounding nails is not my forte). I signed up since my brother wanted to help. I found the scope of the work project very ambitious (shingling the exterior walls of two very large 2 story buildings). There were over 160 volunteers working together with Rotarians and guests that they were not necessarily acquainted with. Looking around, I realized what Rotary is all about; working together to accomplish good things (and having fun doing it). Seeing the larger scope of this project as opposed to our own Club projects really showed me the "big picture" of Rotary in a different way than I had experienced before. I guess I had a "Rotary Flash"; I would recommend it to anyone! (And, if I ever need to shingle a building, I am all ready!!)

Although it's a busy time of year, several people from our club were able to attend; in addition to my brother and myself, we were represented by Tony Wagner, Dan & Edie Davidson, Dick Yerxa, Dan Mooers, Mike McGovern and Nancy Hawes. I wonder if their arms and backs ached as much as mine did

# THIS WEEK'S MEETING JUNE 9, 1999 HE PROGRAM

Rita Hennessy, widow of Tom Hennessy, a longtime and much missed member of our club, introduced their daughter Emily Hennessy. A second year student at Drew University, Emily recently went, with some support from our club, with other Drew students to Honduras to assist in group homes there for abused and orphaned children. The Honduras Project, conceived and run by



students, took 36 students in iviay for a two-week service effort. The group divided into two groups and worked in two homes, then switched so that each

group would have the benefit of working in both locations. They also visited a third, federally operated orphanage.

Carrying 12 suitcases full of clothes and other needed items for distribution to the children, Emily's group repainted and cleaned the home for mistreated and orphaned girls, and reinstalled a bathroom, painted rooms and did other work at the boys' home. Part of her group also worked at the farm where boys from the home spend some of their time.

In reflecting on her work there, Emily told us of lessons she learned from her work. She will never look at children the same again, having learned that "given a chance, any child can be a loving individual." Calling the children by name meant everything to them, she said, and the college students were able to expand the children's world view and (Con't Page -2-)

Emily, thank you, and we are so very proud of what you are accomplishing, and we see your dad smiling too.



Dear Members:

My fourth dream was - to have fun! I don't know about the rest of you but I've had a blast. I had fun at every single meeting, fund raiser and project. I especially enjoyed having guests with us, as at the lobster bake, Greek Night, Mike's party and the transition night. And I pretty much laugh all night long at poker nights. 

Australian Rotarians partner students, parents and teachers

Confronted with the problem of teens at risk, Rotarians in Goodna, Queensland, Australia, designed early intervention project to address the issues of homelessness, drug addiction, crime and low self-esteem in youth. The Partnership Project, based on similar programs developed in the U.S., builds links between primary schools, parents and students before the youngsters fall behind in school and life.

Begun in three local schools in 1996, the ongoing project works to create an environment in which children can experience positive social and academic development. Teachers receive training in behavior management; parents are invited to participate in courses to enhance their parenting skills; and students receive encouragement and counseling. The Rotary Club of Goodna provided funds to establish and maintain the project in the schools with the help of the Stan Viertel Foundation and the Oueensland state government. Club members hope to expand the intervention program into other area schools.

Though it is too early to measure results, school principals are impressed so far. One praised the Partnership Program as "enabling us to
