dent Warren Simpson, Dan Gazette (all of Cape Elizabeth) and Richard Yerxa of Portland


Sadly, charter member William Stanton passed away less than one month prior to the ceremony.

Rotary Marks Its 40th

Richard Kilroy and Warren Simpson, Cape Elizabeth, the first and second (respectively) presidents of the South Portland- Cape Elizabeth Rotary Club, were specially honored when the club celebrated its 40th birthday Jan. 19 at Verrillo's, Portland.

Both are charter members and have perfect attendance records.

"What that says is, Good Health," said Simpson, former owner of Shoppers True Value Hardware, South Portland, who is 85.

Dan Gacetta, Cape Elizabeth, and Richard Yerxa, Portland, the club's other living charter members, also were honored.

The anniversary brought the world president of Rotary, Richard D. King, Fremont, Calif., and King's visit brought a crowd, 384 people, including at least one from each of 80 Rotary Clubs.

King told them he had been

warned not to attend anniversaries or he'd have one to attend every night. He was persuaded to come to Maine by his aide Dan Mooers, South Portland lawyer and former Rotary International director.

On Jan. 18, King had installed six new Rotary Clubs in Clearwater, Fla., with 750 attending. Among them was Richard Kilroy, now in a wheelchair, who didn't make the trip north for the local 40th. He keeps his attendance record by visiting Florida clubs.

At its 40th, the South Portland-Cape Elizabeth Rotary counts \$400,000 raised over the years for charity and people in need, including more than \$75,000 in scholarships.

It has contributed \$29,000 to "Polio Plus," Rotary International drive to eliminate polio world-wide by 2005. It began in 125 countries, and today only 10 are still afflicted by polio.
