The questions served as a starting point for an interactive discussion amongst the panelists on this very complex issue. One of the central themes that came out of this discussion was that early intervention is very important in identifying and limiting the scope of the problem. Both South Portland and Cape Elizabeth panelists emphasized that they worked very closely with each other in dealing with this problem. The program ended with questions from the audience and was very well received by the 55+ people in attendance.

Foundation Minute - Frank Butterworth reports that we're on track to meet the club's Annual Giving goal for this Rotary year. However we have a way to go to meet the Every Rotarian, Every Year (EREY) goal. April 30 is the deadline for the club to be recognized at the District Conference. In order to be counted, the amount does not matter – just as long as each member gives something. Some members suggested that they be sent a reminder email. Other ways to donate include the blue bag at the Secretary's table and going online to donate.

<u>"Inspired by Ann Lee Hussey"</u> – this is the notation that 8-year-old Finn wrote on his poster advertising a bake sale to raise money for polio eradication. Every time she speaks about polio, Past District Governor and polio survivor Ann Lee Hussey's audiences are inspired by her. Ann Lee reviewed the current status of polio – it still survives in some areas of Nigeria, Afghanistan and Pakistan – areas that are difficult to reach due to conflict or rugged terrain. Recently polio workers were killed in Nigeria & Afghanistan, which makes it all the more imperative that polio be eradicated so that their deaths will not be in vain. The Independent Monitoring Board (IMB) reports that we are on track to completely eradicate polio by 2018. (Note: If you have never given to PolioPlus, consider doing so in order that you can be proud of eradicating polio when it happens!) Our club and all Rotarians agree with Finn who told Ann Lee, "I just want it to end!"
