<u>Colonel Paul McKenney</u>, former member of our club and now a Rotarian in Phoenix, Arizona, was not only a welcome guest but our speaker. He gave a fascinating talk about the history of Afghanistan, from urbanization in 3,000 B.C. through tribal feuding, to Alexander the Great, to Genghis Khan, to British and Russian domination, to US involvement, to the Taliban, to the present day. Paul went to Afghanistan in 2011 with a team of Canadians to help the Afghan Army with officer training procedures. Paul's philosophy coincides with a paraphrase of T. E. Lawrence (Lawrence of Arabia) that it is better for them to do something tolerably than for us to do it for them.

<u>Polio Recap</u> – Past District Governor Ann Lee Hussey shared this information on the status of polio eradication as of mid-December:

- In Afghanistan, no indigenous cases of wild poliovirus have occurred all year all cases are linked to cross-border transmission with neighboring Pakistan.
- In Nigeria, poliovirus is increasingly geographically restricted primarily to Kanod and Borno states. Over the past 4 months, only four cases have occurred in the country, despite the onset of the rainy season (the "high season" for polio transmission).
- The Horn of Africa outbreak is on the decline, including in Banadir, Somalia, the "engine" of the outbreak (no cases since July).
- A cross-regional emergency approach is being implemented in the Middle East.
- In Pakistan, the main reservoir area is Federally Administered Tribal Areas (FATA), in particular North Waziristan. During the "high season" in the past four months, 52 cases of wild poliovirus have been reported from FATA, with evidence of widespread geographic transmission across the country. Areas within Pakistan are being re-infected, as is neighboring Afghanistan, and the outbreak in the Middle East originated in Pakistan.
