Peace Jam! – Our speakers this week were CEHS senior Stephen Bennett and sophomore Tony Inhorn. I was so glad to hear this program because as treasurer I knew that as a club we had helped CEHS students to attend Peace Jam conferences but I had no idea what it was all about. (It conjures up images of hippies with flowers in their hair!) Peace Jam is actually an international organization formed by 13 Nobel Peace Prize laureates – so, great credentials! High schools and colleges around the world form local chapters, and Stephen founded the one at CEHS. The project that they undertook this year was to assist with bullying prevention in the 7<sup>th</sup> and 8<sup>th</sup> grades. The international organization has a bullying curriculum which the CEHS students used with small groups of middle-school students. Stephen and Tony feel that the work they are doing is having an impact, and Tony hopes to expand to 5<sup>th</sup> and 6<sup>th</sup> graders when he takes over as president of the club next year. The objectives of Peace Jam coincide so well with one of The Rotary Foundation goals (Peace and Conflict Resolution) that it was nice to learn that we have been mentoring an organization that mirrors Rotary so well.

<u>Another Goal of The Rotary Foundation</u> – One of the other goals of The Rotary Foundation is Economic and Community Development. Past District Governor and occasional visitor to our club Marty Helman recently attended an RI Conference on Economic Development in Cape Town, South Africa. Here's an excerpt from her report about the conference:

"As an American, the following statistics helped me put Africa's economic realities into perspective: At the current time, the official U.S. unemployment rate is just under 5 percent, and at the worst of the Great Depression in the '30s it reached 25 percent. Today, South Africa's official unemployment rate is 25 percent, and most of the rest of Africa is closer to 75 or 80 percent. Meanwhile, for every job that is created through entrepreneur-ship, an average of another three jobs quickly follow. Even a woman selling vegetables at the side of the road typically employs the rest of her family in the business. So the key to economic development — the key to alleviation of poverty — is to find ways to train and sustain entrepreneurs."

Funding for micro-grants is one of the ways that The Rotary Foundation helps to promote economic development.
