DISTRICT EVENT #2 – If it's been a while since you've gone trick or treating, you're probably overdue for dressing up in costume. The District is holding a costume party at One Longfellow Square as a fundraiser and to raise awareness about human trafficking (yes, it happens right here in Maine). A Taste of Honey – Our speaker this week was Ben Alexander, the founder of Maine Mead Works, located in the old J.J. Nissen building on Washington Avenue in Portland. Ben founded the company in 2007 in collaboration with a South African scholar who had developed a state-of-the-art continuous fermentation system. Mead is the oldest of all fermented beverages, the result of wild yeast fermenting in honey when water is added. It has qualities that are similar to both wine and beer. It goes especially well with seafood, spicy food and cheese, and an open bottle can keep without spoiling for at least 6 months. Maine Mead Works is one of the top 5 producers of mead in the country and you can find their products at Hannaford. Tours of the meadery are available at 11:30 and 3:00 Monday – Saturday, and the Tasting Room is open 11:00-6:00 Monday – Saturday and 12:00-4:00 on Sundays.
