Besides our FB page, we will also be submitting articles – hopefully with pictures – about our doings to the local papers. And by "we," I mean Adrienne – thanks, Adrienne, for volunteering to help with our publicity!

<u>Timely Topic!</u> – At this week's meeting we had a very informative presentation about the facts concerning medical marijuana. Gillian Graham, a reporter for the Portland Press Herald, became an "expert" on marijuana by default when one of the towns in her beat (York) had a local proposal to legalize marijuana. In covering that proposal and other marijuana issues, she learned a lot that she shared with us. Did you know, for instance, that:

- Last year Mainers spent \$26.3 million on medical marijuana from the 8 dispensaries (and an unknown additional amount from caregivers).
- In order to purchase medical marijuana you have to be certified by a physician; this is required every year.
- There is an increasing number of physicians in Maine (currently about 300) who are willing to certify patients.
- There are about 2,800 caregivers who are allowed to grow marijuana for up to 5 patients, with up to 6 mature plants per patient (plus additional plants in the growing stages).
- There are a handful of patients who are abusing the 5-patient limit by maintaining a revolving patient base.
- There is an increasing demand for marijuana strains that don't make you high (for pediatric use, for instance).
- The ballot proposal in November for recreational use would be for lesser amounts of marijuana; the existing rules for medical marijuana would be unchanged.

Who Was Arch Klumph? – Many of us have heard of Arch Klumph and may know that there is an "Arch Klumph Society" for donors who have made very large gifts to the Rotary Foundation. But besides being a man with a funny name, who was Arch Klumph? Basically he was the creator of The Rotary Foundation – here's a little bit more about him:

A founding member of the Rotary Club of Cleveland, Ohio, Arch C. Klumph personified the term "self-made man." Forced to leave school at age 12 to help with the expenses, Arch Klumph went to work as a variety store "cash boy" for \$3 per week. A few months later, he became an office boy at the Travelers' Insurance Company and began studying bookkeeping in his spare time.

The father of one of Klumph's friends was so impressed with the initiative and organizational skills of the teenage Klumph that he hired him – for \$1 a day – as an office boy at Cuyahoga Lumber Company. Klumph would work all day and then attend classes at night – often walking 4 miles each way to save the tram fare. Klumph did so well that he became president of the lumber company in 1898 and sole owner in 1912, turning Cuyahoga Lumber into one of the most successful building supply companies in the Midwest.

And so it was not surprising that this country farm boy who came to own successful businesses in lumber and box making would be invited to join the new Rotary Club of Cleveland. His term as the club's fourth president was successful by all accounts, but it is in his closing address that we glimpse the origins of Klumph's history-making vision for Rotary. Having described himself as a man who "thinks Rotary, sleeps Rotary, and dreams Rotary," he proposed that "an emergency fund should be built up which will enable the club in future years to do many things."
