<u>End Polio Now</u> – You probably received an email from Past District Governor Lawrence Furbish about the End Polio Now livestream event on Monday at 6 p.m. If you're free then, make a point of logging on – it should be very informative and inspirational. Here's where we are as of today according to the Global Eradication Initiative website. There are only 3 endemic countries in the world:

- ❖ Afghanistan There have been 8 wild polio virus cases so far this year the last one was on August 11.
- ❖ Pakistan There have been 15 wild polio virus cases so far this year the most recent was on September 3.
- ❖ Nigeria There have been 4 cases this year in a country (and continent!) that we had hoped was polio-free. The last case was on August 21. A massive immunization effort is currently taking place there and in the other countries surrounding Lake Chad.

<u>Be Prepared!</u> – Marc Bates must have been a Boy Scout because he was able to give us a polished presentation on extremely short notice. Of course it helped that Robin brought their 3 adorable children, Itzhak, Elena and Jewel, to the meeting as props. Marc spoke about the business that he and Robin operate, Jewel's Custom Books. <u>100 Years of The Rotary Foundation</u> – For many years Rotarians identified the Foundation with scholarships. Here is how it all started:

When the 1947-48 school year began, 18 young men from Belgium, China, England, France, Mexico, Palestine and the United States immersed themselves in their chosen academic fields in countries far from home.

For the 1956-57 school year, The Rotary Foundation funded 116 new Fellows from 30 countries to attend schools in 23 nations. In its first decade, 821 Rotary Fellows from 61 countries had been ambassadors of peace for a year of study abroad – all funded with \$2.5 million in donations that Rotarians had made to their Rotary Foundation. For the following 40 years, scholarships were the most visible and important Foundation program, creating a worldwide network of students who fulfilled Rotary's goal of promoting international understanding and goodwill.
