Congratulations to Dave Bagdasarian & President Fran - they are the proud grandparents of a 3rd grandson, with another grandson expected any day!

Maine Cancer Foundation – Dave Bagdasarian introduced our speaker Ray Ruby from Maine Cancer Foundation (MCF) by recounting the close history our club has had with MCF in the early years of the road race. Ray is the Community Outreach Manager for MCF, but before that was a Portland policeman and then worked for the SP Boys & Girls Club. Ray reiterated our history with MCF as well as our pivotal role in forming the B/G Club. MCF has grown nearly tenfold since we had a relationship with them, thanks in large part to the Tri-for-a-Cure, which raises about \$2 million. Ray's primary message to us was that ALL of the money raised by MCF stays in Maine. MCF is in the midst of the Challenge Cancer 2020 Initiative, which started in 2015 with a target of reducing the incidence of cancer in Maine



- by 20% by 2020. They plan to do this through awarding statewide grants targeted at:
 - 1. Prevention (e.g. social media campaigns aimed at Maine teens to make them aware that they are target customers of Big Tobacco; sunscreen dispensers at ballparks & ski slopes)
 - 2. Early Detection & Screening (e.g. breast cancer screening, lung cancer screening, HPV vaccinations)
 - 3. Access to High Quality Treatment (e.g. transportation services to tests & treatment, especially in northern & DownEast Maine)

Ray was very proud of MCF's transparency – you can see all the grants that MCF has awarded on their website (just click on "View All Awarded Grants") – website is mainecancer.org

<u>Sustainable Development Goals</u> – When I attended the RI Convention in Toronto last month with my sister and brother-in-law, I was explaining to them about The Rotary Foundation (TRF) and happened to mention the UN Millennium Development Goals (MDG). They weren't familiar with them so we googled them and compared them with TRF's 6 Areas of Focus. The MDG started out as 8 goals to be completed in 2015 – like the Areas of Focus, they were primarily focused on improving the lives of people living in poverty. They were replaced in 2016 with 17 Sustainable Development Goals (SDG) which expanded the original goals to also focus on several goals aimed at bettering life for all of us by preventing environmental degradation and promoting equality and justice. The 17 goals are:

- 1. End poverty in all its forms everywhere.
- 2. End hunger, achieve food security and improved nutrition and promote sustainable agriculture.
- 3. Ensure healthy lives and promote well-being for all at all ages
- 4. Ensure inclusive and quality education for all and promote lifelong learning
- 5. Achieve gender equality and empower all women and girls
- 6. Ensure access to water and sanitation for all
- 7. Ensure access to affordable, reliable, sustainable and modern energy for all
- 8. Promote inclusive and sustainable economic growth, employment and decent work for all
- 9. Build resilient infrastructure, promote sustainable industrialization and foster innovation
- 10. Reduce inequality within and among countries
- 11. Make cities inclusive, safe, resilient and sustainable
- 12. Ensure sustainable consumption and production patterns
- 13. Take urgent action to combat climate change and its impacts
- 14. Conserve and sustainably use the oceans, seas and marine resources
- 15. Sustainably manage forests, combat desertification, halt and reverse land degradation, halt biodiversity loss
- 16. Promote just, peaceful and inclusive societies
- 17. Revitalize the global partnership for sustainable development
