Opening Words – Rich opened the meeting with these remarks from Sylvia Whitlock, the first female president of a Rotary club in 1987:

Dave and Linda visited us in order to present the 2017-18 Rotary year Presidential Citation to our club. The citation recognizes the depth and breadth of our club's service activities. <u>Who has the best Picnics??</u> - According to our District Governor John, for a long time what he and Sue knew about Rotary was that they had the best picnics. However thanks to Frank Butterworth inviting him to our lobsterbake, he realized that Rotary was "a group of really nice people who do really nice things for the community." So if you ever need to explain Rotary to anyone, this definition is as good as any. John spoke on several topics – here are some highlights:

Membership – he challenged us to gain 10% in new members, but not to lose more than

5%. He quoted the late Sam Owori who would have been RI President this year, who lamented that of all the billions of people in the world, "it's a shame that only 1.2 million are Rotarians."

- Literacy he is also challenging each club to build or maintain at least one Little Free Library.
- RYLA he described this program (which our club supports very strongly) as "one of the very best things we do as a district."
- District Conference this year's conference will be at Fort Williams, the site of John's first Rotary meeting! It will be free of charge and will include a lot of children's activities.
- The Rotary Foundation the Bill & Melinda Gates Foundation funnels its support of polio eradication through The Rotary Foundation, so "if it's good enough for Bill Gates, it's good enough for me." John was recognized for his steadfast support of the Foundation with a Paul Harris Fellow + 4 pin.

President Fran presented a monogrammed jacket to John and announced that the club had made a donation (above and beyond our budgeted donation) to The Rotary Foundation in John's name. She also presented a lovely bouquet of flowers to Sue.
