Not Enough Rotary Clubs! – That's probably not what you would have expected to be the core message of a speaker on opioid addiction! But in fact Tim Cheney pointed out that the root problem of addiction is the loss of a sense of community, and that drugs are a response to hopelessness and a loss of connection.

Karen Vachon met Tim when she was a freshman legislator and he testified on bills related to drug treatment. Tim became addicted to drugs at a very young age and after several relapses finally became drug-free in 1981 and has been so ever since. Although never having gone to high school, he graduated from Yale and went on to get a Ph.D. He founded an HR company which he eventually sold to a public company, and then became CEO of that company. After retiring five years ago, he saw the lack of services available to the addicted, and became an activist. He invests his time and money in recovery clinics and has received numerous awards for his activism in this area.

Tim pointed out that there are a lot of recovered addicts like himself, but society views them as modern day lepers so most are not open about their past. His central message (along with the idea that we need to restore the sense of community in our society) was that we need to change our perceptions and remove the stigma associated with opioid addiction.
