<u>Tree Time is Almost Here!</u> – Club members should have received an email from Scott Irving with a link to sign up for selling Christmas trees. (If you didn't get the email or you deleted it, you can always sign up by going to the club website and looking under Upcoming Events.) Note that there are separate signup links for lot set-up, the tree deliveries and actual selling. A few notes:

- ♣ After the first few days of the sale, pay attention to whether you're signing up for Lot or Curbside. If you sign up for Curbside, you must be able to carry a tree, since that's what you'll be doing carrying trees to the cars of customers who have already paid for them.
- ♣ Shifts are shorter this year 2 hours so rather than sign up for 4 shifts of 3 hours each as we did in the past, we should be signing up for 6 shifts of 2 hours each. (This is in addition to volunteering for lot set-up and tree deliveries.)
- ♣ If you volunteered to be a Customer Service Representative or other offsite volunteer work, you do not need to sign up you will be contacted about your duties.
- ▶ We are going to be short-staffed this year so if you have able-bodied family members who are willing and would feel comfortable helping out, please consider signing them up too!

<u>UN's Diamond Jubilee!</u> – Sue Sturtevant presented a Rotary Foundation Minute on the relationship of Rotary and the United Nations. Rotary was invited to participate in the conference in the spring of 1945 in which delegates from 50 countries met in San Francisco to write the UN's charter. On October 24, 1945 when the UN came into being, Rotary was given the highest status afforded to a non-governmental agency and has maintained a close relationship with the UN ever since.

<u>The Fruitcake Club!</u> – Our speaker this week was Mike McGovern, who researched our club's history and put together a power point presentation which was "very interesting and wicked informative" according to one of the chats. One of the things that he pointed out is that in the early years of the Christmas tree sale, we made more money selling fruitcakes than Christmas trees, and speculated that we could have become the Fruitcake club rather than the Christmas

Tree club.
