**Paul Harris Butler** – Betty Egner led our Foundation Minute this week by summarizing the history of Paul Harris Fellow recognition and what it is. She mentioned some well-known PHFs including Mother Theresa, President Jimmy Carter, Dr. Jonas Salk, Dr. Anthony Fauci and Maine CDC Director Dr. Nirav Shah. Over the years, our own club has had 159 Paul Harris Fellows as well as 40 additional "Multiple" Paul Harris Fellows. One of those Multiple PHFs is Paul Butler who received his PHF+3 pin virtually at this week's meeting. (*Do we have to honor you to get you to come to our meetings, Paul???*) Paul joined our club in 1974 and was club president in 1980-81 and served as secretary for many years. But his most distinguished title is winner of the 2018-19 football pool (in a tie-breaker!).



**Blue Glasses?** – The "program" this week was a club assembly and after a very generous happy dollar session, we separated into randomly assigned break-out rooms to discuss how we could improve the weekly meeting experience. Our group immediately tackled this by talking about where Jim Britt got his glasses (online for \$6.99 per set of frames), which led to the first item on this list of suggestions from the groups:

- More opportunities for small group chit chat (which can serve as a substitute for the pre-6:15 conversations at our Purpoodock meetings, which some of us really miss)
- > Invite students to meetings (RYLA, scholarship recipients, Interact)
- More classification talks
- Devote program time for the club to brainstorm ways that we could be of service to the community.
- > Put a moment of levity on the agenda each week (see Dave Barry above!).
- ➢ Hold an in person meeting at the tree lot.
- Reach out to people who haven't been zooming and encourage them to join us.
- Have members of the board lead the meetings sometimes to give our president a little break.

(Just a note on this last item – I led a forum for club treasurers in the district this week and there were about the same number of attendees as a typical SPCE meeting. It's NOT EASY to follow your agenda while at the same time paying attention to all the chats, looking for people with their hand up, etc. Kudos to President Mike – Countless Names for doing this so seamlessly for the past 7 months!)

# WORLD POLIO DAY

Last Saturday our district held an information session on polio eradication, which had a starstudded cast of presenters and was quite fascinating.

The first presenter was **Michel Zaffran**, the head of Global Polio Eradication for the WHO. He described a new Polio Type 2 vaccine which has been developed and they are on the threshold of deploying. (There were originally 3 types of polio and Type 2 is the only type that has not been eradicated.) I won't pretend to understand the science but they expect this vaccine to be much more effective and give us a better shot at completely eradicating polio.

The second speaker was **Dr. Tunji Funsho**, Rotary's head of polio eradication in Nigeria (and recently named one of Time's 100 Most Influential People of 2020). He spoke about lessons learned – and these lessons pretty much apply to COVID-19 as well as to polio:

- ✓ "You can't shave a man's head in his absence" i.e. just having a vaccine isn't enough there has to be buy-in from governments and the beneficiaries of the need for the vaccine.
- ✓ Disease eradication costs a lot of money.
- ✓ *The virus wants to survive* and keeps popping up in places where it's hard to eradicate.
- ✓ Technology is a great ally in disease eradication.
- ✓ No challenge is insurmountable when people come together.

The third speaker was the RI Chair of PolioPlus, **Michael McGovern** of the Rotary Club of South Portland-Cape Elizabeth. Here is some information from his slides:

- 19 million people are walking on earth who would otherwise have been paralyzed. An estimated 650,000 cases are now prevented each year.
- Since 1988, 3 billion children have received oral polio vaccine.
- In 2019, more than 430 million children in 40+ countries were vaccinated using 1.2 billion doses of oral polio vaccine.
- We have gone four years without a case of wild polio virus outside Pakistan and Afghanistan.
- We have helped with other vaccine preventable diseases through PolioPlus and have assisted the world in responding to Ebola and COVID-19.

Mike also included a list of grants that were being forwarded to the Rotary Foundation trustees for their approval. These requests are made 3 times a year for a total of \$150,000,000 (\$50M in Rotary donations and \$100,000,000 from the Gates match).
