OPENING WORDS

This Week: Scott Irving shared a photo taken of Earth from Voyager in which we see our planet as a very small dot, and the words of Carl Sagan describing it:

"Look again at that dot. That's here. That's home. That's us. On it everyone you love, everyone you know, every human being who ever was, lived out their lives...every saint and sinner in the history of our species lived there--on a mote of dust suspended in a sunbeam.

The Earth is a very small stage in a vast cosmic arena. Think of the rivers of blood spilled by all those generals and emperors so that, in glory and triumph, they could become the momentary masters of a fraction of a dot. Think of the endless cruelties visited by the inhabitants of one corner of this pixel on the scarcely distinguishable inhabitants of some other corner, how frequent their misunderstandings, how eager they are to kill one another, how fervent their hatreds.

The Earth is the only world known so far to harbor life. There is nowhere else, at least in the near future, to which our species could migrate. Like it or not, for the moment the Earth is where we make our stand.

There is perhaps no better demonstration of the folly of human conceits than this distant image of our tiny world. To me, it underscores our responsibility to deal more kindly with one another, and to preserve and cherish the pale blue dot, the only home we've ever known."

Then Scott summed up: "Rotary is a ray of hope, an organization leads to peace and understanding through common purpose, fellowship, and helping others through service.

<u>Saving Maine Farms</u> – Our speakers this week were Caroline Ginsberg, Membership Director of the Maine Farmland Trust (MFT), and Chris Franklin, Farmland Protection Project Manager at MFT. Chris was already known to many in the audience as he was previously Executive Director of the Cape Elizabeth Land Trust. They explained to us that only about 700,000 acres in Maine are currently being farmed vs. about 10 times that amount a century ago. The large

number of farmers near retirement age, the high cost of going into farming from scratch, and the unstable nature of the income mean that this trend will only continue. The Maine Farmland Trust aims to protect farmland from further development. Their most expensive project to date has been the purchase of the Maxwell farm in Cape Elizabeth – the land is valued at close to \$2 million. MFT expects to close on the sale of the easement (restricting development rights) at the end of November.

<u>Million Masks!</u> – As reported last week, southern Maine Rotary clubs received a shipment of masks on Tuesday at Portland City Hall to be distributed to first responders and health care providers. Thank you to **Sari** who was on hand to pick up our club's share of masks, and to **Tony** who helped with the set-up at the event.
