<u>A Word from the RI PolioPlus Chair (i.e. Michael McGovern)</u> – The following article was written last week at the request of an End Polio Now newsletter in Mexico, but we can pretend it was written to us.

Greetings to all of you. It is now late November and the world has seen only four cases of the wild polio virus in 2021. Two weeks ago we were saddened to hear that two children, a boy and a girl, had become infected with polio in Kanduz, Afghanistan. This news was received just as a two week national immunization drive in Afghanistan was ending. The drive appeared to be a good start after three years of the country being partially inaccessible. Now, with all areas of the country under one control and the new government indicating a commitment to enhancing polio eradication activities, we look for continuing progress in the country. The vaccination drive had some house to house vaccinations and some areas where parents had to take their children to a vaccination site. Fortunately, Kanduz is a location where house to house vaccinations occurred thus reaching more children.

On 23<sup>rd</sup> November we heard that an environmental sample in Tank District in Pakistan tested positive for polio. This is not a polio case but shows that polio is still circulating in the area. We also heard that the two cases in Kanduz were genetically related to the same virus found in Tank this week. In other words, the cases in Kanduz and the positive environmental sample are connected.

Just an a hour before writing this, our Pakistan Rotary Polio Chair Trustee Aziz Memon and I met with a small group with Pakistan Prime Minister Imran Khan. He agreed to use all measures to respond to the environmental positive result and to work with Afghanistan to eradicate polio. He also had much praise for Rotary and the support all of you have given.

Everyone's support around the world is crucial at this point. Chris Elias, the Chair of the Polio


Oversight Board in the meeting with Prime Minister Khan said we are truly "this close." He is also the Global President of Development for the Bill and Melinda Gates Foundation. Not everyone has always felt that we were very close, so hearing this today was welcome news. Thank you for all that you do to eradicate polio.
