Passing the Baton - Thank you to Mike McGovern who has been our program chair for the past 18 months. During that time we've had some excellent programs ranging from our own members (Jim Britt, Sari Greene, Patty Sprague, Bill York) to Rotary "dignitaries (Mark Maloney, Brenda Cressey, Brian King) to town and city leaders (SP Superintendent of Schools Tim Matheney, CE Town Planner Maureen O'Meara) to Rotary Foundation projects (Tony Wagner – wells in Guatemala; Marty Helman – Uganda project) to my favorites – learning about local businesses/organizations (Joe Cassidy - President of SMCC, Gary Moretti - owner of a mussel business, Hank Berg – Casco Bay Lines). This is just a sampling of the many excellent programs that Mike has coordinated for us.

John LoBosco is stepping into the role of Program Chair and has already lined up a couple great programs for us – our district's newest peace scholar on January 19 who will be studying in Queensland, Australia, and a speaker on February 2 about the future of broadband and technology in general in Maine.

<u>A Rotary Foundation "Moment"</u> – One of our members recently made a generous donation to The Rotary Foundation but does not want to be acknowledged for their contribution at a club meeting. But they (and by "they" I mean I won't give you a clue whether it's a man or woman) are willing to put into words anonymously why they gave to The Rotary Foundation.

"Over the last few years I have made a conscious decision to make all of my charitable donations, except for one, to LOCAL organizations that have substantive and meaningful impact on issues in the community that are important to me. The sole exception has been The Rotary Foundation. Mike McGovern's heartfelt, passionate presentation on December 8 about his work on behalf of the Foundation to eradicate polio reinforced the notion that this international effort - as well as other Foundation causes - has an overwhelmingly positive effect on the LOCAL communities in those countries. In addition to polio eradication, Mike and others have shared their observations about the terrible living conditions and other situations that use both Foundation funds and Rotarians-at-work to improve the health and lives of those in need. The breadth and scope of Rotary causes check all the right boxes for me, both locally and internationally. I am happy to know that my small contribution, along with everyone else's, is helpful in trying to meet the basic human needs and economic opportunities we often take for granted. I encourage others in the club to make whatever contribution you can - within your own means - to the Foundation."

<u>The Iris Network</u> — Our speaker this week was Regal Naseef, the Director of Development and Communication for the Iris Network, which was formerly known as the Maine Center for the Blind. Among other things, the Iris Network provides visual rehabilitation services to older Mainers who are losing their vision. Their therapists demonstrate gadgets and teach techniquies which allow many people to live independently. Regal mentioned Helen Keller's role in founding the original school for the blind in Maine. Regal sent John a letter that Helen Keller had written on Feb. 7, 1905 to William Ryan (the founder of the Maine Center for the Blind) for him to use in soliciting funds from the Maine legislature. Here is an excerpt:

"The blind do not ask for your charity or for your pity. They do not ask you to accept inferior work at their hands. They ask you to train them in order that they may become producers instead of burdens upon the community. Every State in the Union should have at least two schools for the blind, one for the young, that is, purely educational school, the other a work school with a workshop which shall train them in some useful occupation. The object of such a school would be to send out active, competent workmen who can earn at least a part of their living. We are not content with an education that does not fit us to do something."
