Let There be Peace – The reason for all our extra guests was our guest speaker, who is our district's newest Peace Fellowship recipient Cassandra Varanka. Among our guests were her mom Sally and her uncle George Szok from the Bridgton Lake Region club who put her name forward as a candidate. She was introduced by Bob Gravino from the Bath Sunrise club, who is Chair of the Peace Scholars Foundation Subcommittee. Cassandra is from Amherst, NH and graduated from St. Michael's in Vermont. She is one of 50 recipients of the award each year, which covers study at one of seven Rotary Peace Centers formed in partnership with universities. Another of our guests was Marty Helman of the Boothbay Harbor club who was instrumental in a donation which will create the newest Peace Center in the Middle East. Programs last 15-24 months and include a 2-3 month field study. Cassandra will be studying at the University of Queensland in Australia starting next January, shortly after getting married. Among her qualifications she was a legislative assistant to Rep. Jan Schakowsky and is currently a Professional Staff Member for the U.S. House of Representatives Homeland Security Committee. It's Playoff Time! – The football pool fun continues into the playoffs, and three members picked all 6 games correctly last weekend – "Half in the Bags," "Scooby Dube" and Jim "Big Red" Britt – although apparently there is some controversy over whether you're allowed to win the pool if you pick the Patriots to lose.

<u>Why Is It Called the Yorkie?</u> – As its founder Bill York recalls, I was "sitting on a barstool in Siano's and filling out my weekly 'bookie' bet and complaining about losing my money and thinking about other options." That was back in 2016 and thanks to Bill's brilliant idea, the football pool has raised a minimum (some gave more than the \$50 entrance fee and I can't tell how much was raised for the playoffs) of \$8,050 in the five years that we have been playing (no pool in 2020). Our entrance fees were donated to PolioPlus, so when the Gates match is added in,

we have raised at least \$24,150 towards polio eradication from the football pool! In addition to Bill, we owe a big debt of thanks to former Commissioner Chuck Redman, and his successor Commissioner Jim Britt. But as we learned last week, the money is just a side benefit – the main point of the pool is that it provides "a life-changing experience" for the winners. The trophy is so meaningful that some winners even sleep with the Yorkie!
