Congratulations to Adrienne who drew her own ticket (!) to win a gift certificate to Highland Farms donated by Sue.


Congratulations to the South Portland High School Interact club with is up to ten students now! Hopefully this trajectory will continue!!

<u>South Portland Food Cupboard</u> – Tony receives weekly updates from Dwayne & Jim at the South Portland Food Cupboard and occasionally he forwards them to me so that I can pass on to you the increasing demands on SPFC, and the consequent need for volunteer assistance. This is from last Friday's update:

This past week saw the highest number of recipients at the SPFC: Tuesday's Distribution – 77 families
Wednesday and Thursday's Distribution – 95 families

In addition to the monthly SP-CE Rotary work party at SPFC which Brent emails us about every month (next event is this coming Thursday), there are also other opportunities to volunteer if Thursday evenings don't work for you. For instance I'm told that a few people help out on Friday mornings. Please contact Tony if you'd like to volunteer but need more information.

Wabanaki Youth in Science (WaYS) – Our speaker this week, introduced by Patty Sprague, was Tish Carr, Executive Director of Wabanaki Youth in Science. Tish has been with WaYS since 2014 and also teaches at SMCC. Of particular interest to SP-CE Rotarians was the fact that she teaches chainsaw safety to female landowners. (Maybe we'll ask her to come back in November!) But this week she spoke about WaYS' mission of integrating Wabanaki traditional cultural knowledge with technology and science. At the conclusion of her talk, Aaron Filieo explained to us that his students at Cape Elizabeth Middle School are currently engaged in the same type of "place-based education" that Tish described. They are doing this at Turkey Hill Farm and for example they have an ongoing ornithology project right now in which each student chooses a bird which they will be studying in depth through the end of this term. He echoed the concepts that Tish brought up of coexistence, community spirit and inter-relatedness. Thanks Patty for bringing this program to our attention!

Where in the World is Mike McGovern? (When Mike was on the RI Board of Directors, the club played this fun game at the Bagdasarian home to learn about all the places Mike had been traveling to.) This week Mike has been in Islamabad advocating for polio eradication. He met with Prime Minister Shehbaz Sharif, who told Mike and other Rotarians present that he would continue to personally monitor the efforts for elimination of polio from the country. He is also stepping up security for the women who administer the polio drops. Safe travels home, Mike!





Flight to End Polio – And speaking of polio, here's what's happening with the two pilots flying solo around the world in a single-engine plane to raise money for polio eradication. They had issues with the plane this week – a new alternator was installed at Pease but there were still mechanical issues so they flew to Long Island where a mechanic there was able to troubleshoot and fix the problem. They flew to Bangor yesterday and as I write this (Saturday morning) they are en route to Newfoundland and will continue to Iceland today, and then to Scotland tomorrow. I wish you all could have heard the inspiring talk these two dedicated guys gave about all the planning that went into this event and the setbacks they overcame. (And if you saw how small their plane is and consider that they will be flying it across the Pacific Ocean, you might conclude that these guys are crazy!) Anyway I hope all their mechanical issues are behind them – if you want to track their progress you can go to FlightAware and type in their aircraft number: N732WP. Mike says the Rotarians in Pakistan are eagerly awaiting the pilots' arrival in Karachi next month.
