<u>TICKS!</u> – This is part of Bob Knupp's introduction of his son Andrew:

Andy is 52 years old, has been employed at Idexx for 18 years and is a graduate of both Dickinson College and the Stern School at NYU with an MBA degree. He is married to a fellow Dickinson graduate, and lives in Cape Elizabeth. He had two daughters, one of whom recently graduated from Holly Cross and the other who is a sophomore at UVM.





For some of us, Andy looked very familiar because we had already seen him twice at club outings to the Maine Mariners hockey games. Here he is on the big board with his mom Judy and his daughters:



Andy spoke about "Our Dogs and the Ticks that Love Them." He described the environmental factors that make ticks more prevalent than ever (climate variations, mobile society, urban sprawl, relocation of dogs for adoption), resulting in a rapid rise in human tick-borne disease cases. (And he told us that if you want to sound smart you can refer to diseases borne by ticks and other bugs as "vector-borne.") He dispelled some myths about ticks, such as that you need to be worried about:

- ✓ Only deer ticks
- ✓ Only small ticks
- \checkmark Only during the summer
- ✓ Only ticks from Lyme Connecticut
- ✓ Only if they've been attached for a while.

In fact you need to be concerned about all ticks, all year round. He also pointed out that they do not fall out of trees or fly – they brush onto you from tall grass or weeds. He encouraged all dog owners to have their dog tested annually – this keeps your dog healthy as well as alerting you to the presence of infected ticks in your area. Thank you, Andy, for this very informative presentation!

<u>Another PHF Pin</u> – Foundation Committee members Sue Sturtevant and Nancy Hawes took a break from cleaning up the rose garden at the entrance to Bug Light Park to present Catherine Callahan with her second Paul Harris Fellow pin. (Sue volunteered to take the photo, as she often does at club meetings also – thanks, Sue, for all the great photos you have contributed to the bulletin including many in this one!) Catherine has a more personal connection to The Rotary Foundation than most of us, having served on the district's outreach trip to Bulgaria several years ago.
