<u>Making Plans</u> – This week's program was a very useful and informative "club assembly" at which we learned the plans each of our five "avenue of service" directors has for the upcoming Rotary Year.

Club Administration (Mike Tranfaglia) – In at nutshell, Mike's goal for this year is "to function well in the post pandemic world." More specifically to:

- Plan for a social event at 3-month intervals *please* let Mike know if you have any suggestions for club social activities.
- Have a balanced meeting calendar with speakers, club assemblies, classification talks and service events.
- Modify physical signage and information about our club.
- Encourage and support efforts to expand our social media presence and content.

This plan may be supplemented by the results of the club's strategic planning process – the club will have an opportunity to discuss the plan at our next club assembly on September 27.

Membership (Matt McAleney) – Matt updated us on recent proposals for new members. His overall goal is to add two members for each member who resigns.

Youth Service (Kiley Wilkens-O'Brien) – In addition to continuing to support our traditional youth programs – RYLA, Scholarships, Interact clubs – Kiley has introduced a new Youth Social Impact Initiative (YSII). Think of it as a Boy Scout Eagle project but open to anyone in our communities ages 15-25 with an idea for improving our communities – and we would also provide funding and mentorship to help the project along.

Action Plans:

- Develop marketing materials and communication plan.
- Secure dedicated mentors who commit to working with youth throughout the process.
- Secure youth ambassadors to promote the project.
- Solicit initial applications

International (Hannah Olshansky) – In addition to continuing to support Rotary Youth Exchanges, Hannah's goal is involvement in three global projects, particularly in South America, Africa and Asia, ideally with an in-person service component. We are currently in the exploration phase – looking for potential projects.

Community Service (Sari Greene) – Just as the other service directors expressed a commitment to supporting existing programs, Sari indicated that we would honor past commitments, e.g. Bug Light, gardens, Veterans, Food Cupboard, municipal employees, senior programming. Other goals are:

- ldentify, fund and support the needs of the communities we serve.
- Expand community engagement and hands-on service opportunities.
- Improve club community service internal communications
- Track and celebrate volunteer hours.

She proposed accomplishing this with 3 committees:

- © Community Outreach Project Group (with subcommittees for the projects noted above Bug Light, etc.)
- © Community Needs and Partnerships, with subcommittees for Grants & Needs Assessments and Partnership Service Opportunities
- Club Engagement & Communications

Sari also described the new Community Grant Pilot Program, offering microgrants (up to \$500) and block grants (up to \$2,500).

The directors plan to give us quarterly updates and you'll be hearing more about the new initiatives. Lots of great stuff in the works!!!!!

<u>Our Own Maytag Repairman</u> – Our Club Protection Officer gave an overview of what the club protection officer's duties are and expressed appreciation that our club does not misbehave in this area and therefore like the Maytag repairman his position is pretty uneventful. He wrapped up by reminding us of the Rotarian Code of Conduct (which follows the 4-Way Test in each issue of the Rotary magazine:

As a Rotarian, I will:

- 1. Act with integrity and high ethical standards in my personal and professional life.
- 2. Deal fairly with others and treat them and their occupations with respect.
- 3. Use my professional skills through Rotary to mentor young people, help those with special needs, and improve people's quality of life in my community and in the world.
- 4. Avoid behavior that reflects adversely on Rotary or other Rotarians.
- 5. Help maintain a harassment-free environment in Rotary meetings, events, and activities; report any suspected harassment; and help ensure non-retaliation to those individuals that report harassment.
