And Yet Another Incredibly Informative Program!! – I think I speak for other members of the club as well when I say that I learned a whole lot at this week's meeting. I guess we all knew that some of the large ships need a pilot to guide them into Portland Harbor but that was the extent of my knowledge. Our speaker, Calvin Klopp grew up on Peaks Island and in Cape Elizabeth and is a graduate of Maine Maritime Academy. In 2017 he became the 2nd youngest fully licensed State Pilot in the US. He is now one of 3 pilots who operate two pilot boats (the Portland Pilot and the Spring Point). Ships may arrive in Portland Harbor 24 hours/day, 365 days per year, and the pilots are responsible for navigating them into the harbor safely, without delay. So they can be called out on very short notice in the middle of the night. To get onto the ships that they pilot, they have to climb a rope ladder – in all kinds of weather! The pictures of these ladders really made us appreciative of the skill required to perform this job. Thank you once again to Chris Speh for bringing us this fascinating program!!
