<u>**RYLA Candidates**</u> – I am writing this on the "deadline" to submit our candidates for the RYLA (Rotary Youth Leadership Awards) camp on June 23-26 (although they will accept candidates up until the camp is full). Thank you to Anne & Bev, who have been interviewing candidates from Cape Elizabeth High School, and Tony & Ray, who interviewed students from South Portland High School.

<u>SpringFest Update</u> – As noted in the calendar above and in the Fireworks article, SpringFest is already under way with the fireworks being the kickoff event, and the second event being a magic show for kids at the South Portland Public Library this coming Saturday. (And see the flyer that Sari sent this morning – spread the word!) Jim reports that plans for the main attraction (May 17-18) are largely firmed up and he and Sari will be sending out requests for volunteers to sign up shortly (see Sari's email this morning requesting Ice Cream Social chairs).

<u>Aquaponics is a Go!</u> – We learned recently that the global grant that the Bridgton Lake Region Rotary Club applied for was approved! The grant will provide for the construction of an aquaponics facility in Colombia and will train girls to be the farmers. Our club donated \$3,000 towards the project.

<u>Judy's Pantry</u> – On March 12 Tony Wagner presented a check on behalf of the club to Judy's Pantry. As you can see from the "big check," we donated \$2,500 to the program which feeds 20 Cape Elizabeth families (roughly 100 people) every other week. Tony also gave them a little check which they can actually cash - accepting it were Nancy Rallis, Laura Simonds and Beth Owens.



<u>SMCC Scholars</u> – You may remember that during the pandemic our club was still active and one of the things that we did under the leadership of John LoBosco and Dave Bagdasarian was to donate \$60,000 that we had set aside for SMCC scholarships directly to the SMCC Foundation. Our club recently received thank you letters from the two students who received our scholarships for the current year. Please scroll down to see the text of their letters. On Thursday, March 28 SMCC held a "tea" for the scholarship donors and recipients to meet each other. President Dan represented our club and we look forward to hearing about the event.

<u>Rising Seas</u> – Dr. Dave Reidmiller, Director of the Climate Center at Gulf of Maine Research Institute (GMRI) and a South Portland resident spoke to us on March 13 on Addressing Climate Change in our Backyard. He began by reviewing GMRI's mission: to develop and deliver collaborative solutions to global ocean challenges. He then shared some sobering statistics with us:

- > The sea level in Portland has risen 8" in the last century.
- > The Gulf of Maine is warming 3x faster than the global average.
- Summer is warming 4x faster than the global average.

These warming trends are due to warming of the Labrador Current (which feeds the Gulf from the north), as well as a widening of the Gulf Stream, which feeds the Gulf from the south.

He spoke about the ramifications of ocean warming on sea life, including the increased hospitality of the Gulf to black sea bass. His presentation was chock full of information so check out his powerpoint that I'm also sending along with this bulletin.

<u>Kids Have All the Fun!</u> – Our presentation on March 27 by Julie Pezzino, Executive Director of the Children's Museum and Theatre of Maine (CMTM) made all the adults in the room wish that they could play at the museum. But good news – adults can attend shows at Maddy's Theatre, even without a kid! Julie is a graduate of Carnegie Mellon and American University and lives in Portland; she is also on the board of Full Plates Full Potential. Julie informed us that CMTM has a new mission, the first since the Museum and Theatre merged in 2008. Their mission: to "set the stage for every child to imagine and learn through play." We all know that CMTM has moved from Free Street to their spiffy new building at Thompsons Point, but did you know that its first location was at what used to be the Pond Cove Annex (now the Thomas Memorial Library) and then they moved to one of the buildings at Fort Williams near the playground (and then to a house on Forest Avenue before moving to Free Street)? Some impressive statistics about CMTM:

- Oldest Children's Theater in the United States
- Most visited museum in Maine
- 5th most visited venue in Maine
- Over 220,000 annual attendees
- Over 20% of their admissions are free or reduced

Julie told us about a myriad of programs that CMTM provides as well as photos of all the cool play areas. If you'd like to see what we adults are missing out on, consider attending their art auction on Friday, May 10, or even volunteering at CMTM!
