<u>Foundation BASEBALL! (from our Foundation Chair Nicole Albert)</u> – A very generous member of our club has come up with a very fun way to raise money and socialize while enjoying a baseball game and maybe even a SeaDog Biscuit if we're lucky!

On Wednesday, July 31 at 6:00 pm, we have two adjoining boxes reserved at Hadlock Field donated to us to use as a fundraiser specifically for PolioPlus. The boxes will hold 44 people, and we are going to "sell" the tickets the same way we "sell" entry into the Football Pool. The minimum donation will be \$40 per ticket. You will either go online and make a donation of at least \$40 per ticket (designating it specifically for PolioPlus), or give me a check made out to the Rotary Foundation (if you can remember, put Polio Plus in the memo line) to send in for you, in order to secure your place. \$40 is the minimum donation, but the SKY IS THE LIMIT.

Note that the game on July 31 has been designated as "Maine Strong Night" and the Sea Dogs will be honoring the Lewiston victims and first responders.

It's still pretty early, but what we're asking you to do now is to let me know - shoot me an email or text me and let me know if you think you're going to want to go and how many tickets you need. When we get closer to the date, we will be reminding you again and asking you to confirm whether you've made the donation to secure your place.

<u>Step Right Up!</u> – The next time we hold our lobsterbake at the picnic shelter, we won't need to pick our way up the precarious trail from the parking lot – there are some gorgeous new granite steps at Fort Williams leading up to the shelter. The town of Cape Elizabeth paid for most of the work but our club had made a commitment to help with the cost of the project a few years ago and so we are making a donation of \$7,500.




Farewell to a Legend – We've all heard of Jonas Salk and Albert Sabin, but John Sever? Dr. John Sever, who passed away last week, was a Rotary District Governor and just as importantly, he was the chief of the Infectious Diseases Branch at the National Institutes of Health in the 1980s. In anticipation of celebrating Rotary's 75th anniversary in 1980, the Rotary Foundation developed a 3-H Fund (Health, Hunger and Humanity) and they wanted to tackle a big project. RI President Sir Clem Renouf asked Dr. Sever if there was a disease that could be eliminated, and his reply was "If a single vaccine were to be selected for the 3-H program, I would recommend poliomyelitis." And the rest is history. But it wasn't that simple – in the early years of Rotary's fight to eradicate polio, the chief opponent was not the virus itself but the skepticism of the global public health community that a mass immunization campaign could be effective. Had it not been for the efforts in the 1980s of pioneers such as Dr. Sever, Dr. Sabin and RI President Carlos Canseco, chances are that polio would still be rampant in many countries. (For those interested in the fascinating story of the early years of the polio campaign, I highly recommend <u>Rotary and the Gift of a Polio-Free World, volume I</u> – let me know if you want to borrow it.)

The Allagash! - Our speaker this week was Chris Speh's college roommate at Bowdoin, Paul Johnson. But Paul didn't drive down from Oakland to spill the tea about Chris. He spoke about the Allagash Wilderness Waterway, whose fisheries were his responsibility in his 35-year career with Maine Inland Fish & Wildlife. Some facts he shared with us about the Allagash:

- ✓ The Allagash Wilderness Waterway is a 92-mile system of lakes and river.
- ✓ The Allagash watershed consists of 1.1 million acres, which would be the size of 40 Maine townships.
- ✓ About 90% of the watershed is privately owned (with the waterway itself being owned by the state)
- \checkmark It is 60 miles from the nearest public roads.
- ✓ It is the largest undeveloped watershed east of the Rocky Mountains.
- ✓ The Allagash wetlands are in near pristine condition and support a rich diversity of plants.
- ✓ The Allagash supports 1/3 of Maine's 1,500 native plant species and there are almost no invasives.
- ✓ Bird populations are actually *increasing* in the Allagash.

This was a fascinating talk engendering lots of questions – thanks, Chris & Ellie, for persuading your friend to speak with us!
