

<u>Bridge Walk</u> – We received this detail from the Portland club about the 2nd annual "Bridging the Gap To End Polio" walk across Casco Bay Bridge and Pint Social – October 19th.

"We will park and meet at 3:45 PM at the Shaw's Market parking lot (180 Waterman Drive, South Portland). At 4 PM our group will walk the bridge. Estimating on the early side of 5 PM, we'll end up at Foulmouthed Brewing at 15 Ocean Street, South Portland for a "Pints for Polio" social event. Foulmouthed will chip in \$1 for every pint sold.

Some members may walk the entire bridge. Others may walk half-way, exiting the bridge at the pedestrian ramp to Thomas Knight Park. From there, it's a short walk to Foulmouthed Brewing."

Another Timely Program – As I read the notes that Nicole took on the program this week, I was struck by how fortunate we are to have so many interesting programs on topics that are in the news and extremely relevant. This was yet another one – our speakers were Marpheen Chann, President and founder of Khmer Maine (Khmermaine.org) and Madeleine Saucier, Manager of Programs and Community Engagement for Maine Immigrant Rights Coalition (Maineimmigrantrights.org). Nicole took extensive notes with lots of information about the 2 organizations so rather than figure out how to condense them, I'm pasting her notes into the bulletin:

Khmer Maine:

Marpheen said that he saw there was no organization in Maine that served Cambodian-Americans (includes anyone with any connection to the Cambodian comm/heritage - including people born in Thai refugee camps, adoptees and their parents).

He started the organization in 2018, had raised \$5000 by 2020 with plans to start a project in Bayside in April. When Covid hit, he offered to give sponsors back their money and 100% told them to keep it - "you'll need it to help the community with Covid." Maine Immigrant Rights Coalition was a valuable partner to them - they got grant money from State, KM subcontracted with them to spend the money on fresh food, Covid masks, and other staples for community members during the early days of Covid.

This opened the door to funding from other organizationss who saw KM doing good work with limited resources.

Areas they are working on now:

<u>Arts & Culture</u> - School teaching traditional Cambodian ballet and folk dance; bilingual language classes are another goal.

<u>Food & Farm</u> - Pilot senior nutrition program - 10 seniors from the community dealing with various health issues, nutrition education through a cultural lens; BIPOC summer youth food leadership program farming, community gardening - the produce was donated to the seniors from the nutrition program.

<u>Civic Education & Engagement</u> - advocating for pro-family, pro-workforce development of immigration policies.

<u>Vision:</u> to see a vibrant, thriving Cambodian community.

Maine Immigrant Rights Coalition:

MIRC was established in 2005 - founded by Immigrant Legal Advocacy Project and sponsored by Maine People's Resource Center with 20 members. Became standalone in 2017. Over 100 member organizations now.

Dedicated to advancement of legal, social and economic outcomes for immigrants in the state of Maine.

Advocacy, collaboration and information sharing are their three pillars. Lately they have been focused on emergency response work in light of the

immigration to Maine that has increased. Migrants are coming to the US Border in record numbers and Maine has become a point of secondary migration. No way to really say how many people have arrived in the state - numbers are "guesses" because many people go straight into their communities and don't receive municipal services.

Mostly from Angola and the Congo, but also Central America (Honduras, El Salvador and Guatemala specifically).

December 2021 started meal program serving culturally familiar or preferred meals for asylum seekers living in hotels in the area who don't have ability to cook for themselves. 6 nights/week, serve 200 dinners that are culturally familiar or preferred. Second location in Saco cooks for immigrants in a hotel in Saco. But as people gain independence and self-sufficiency, the meal provision is slowing down.

77 bed shelter at Salvation Army in Portland, will soon be joining City of Portland for 179 bed shelter for single immigrants in Portland. Run by City initially, taken over by MIRC in 18 months.

Advocating for greater statewide collaboration on response and services for immigrants coming into Maine.

Work with municipalities on appropriate response to immigrants.

Connect individual to resources and services, connect organizations to other organizations

Biggest need: housing and legal immigration needs - not enough housing and not enough immigration lawyers in Maine

MIRC also has advocates who lobby at the legislature on bills that enhance the lives of immigrants and opposing those that harm the lives of immigrants in Maine.
