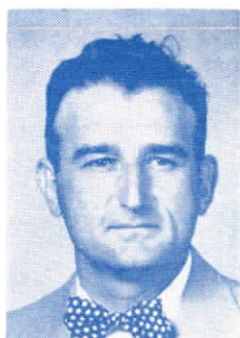
Invocation Introductions Sweetheart
