M. GERARD de la VILLESBRUNNE, COUNSELOR, FRENCH EMBASSY OF WASHINGTON, D.C., SPEAKER
SUBJECT: "FRANCE'S PART IN THE CURRENT EUROPEAN TENSION."

The third of a series of outstanding International Service programs for our Rotary meetings will bring to us M. Gerard de la Villesbrunne, Counselor

of the French Embassy in Washington, D.C. The other two speakers were the Consul General of Sweden and the Consul General of South Africa who spoke recently in a plan to bring to us first hand information directly from official representatives of other countries.

We are honored to have M. de la Villesbrunne with us. He is liaison officer between the French Embassy in Washington and various consulates over the U. S. He is a distinguished gentleman who has served the French nation in a number of posts. He was born in Paris, received his law degree at the University of Paris, graduated from the Ecole des Sciences Politiques of Paris and at the declaration of War in 1939, joined the French Forces. He volunteered in the "Forces Francaises Combatantes" in 1944 and entered the French Ministry of Foreign Affairs in 1945. He was French representative on the quadripartite political division of the Allied Council in Austria; Secretary at the French legation in Vienna and Rio de Janeiro; member of the Ministry of Foreign Affairs, Paris; Special Assistant on General de Gaulle's staff and in 1961 went to Washington as Counselor at the French Embassy. He is "Chevalier" of the Legion of Honor and was awarded the "Croix de Guerre 1939-45".

Last Week

The Honorable John Connally, Governor of the State of Texas, speaking to the first joint meeting of all Rotary and Lion's Clubs, had nothing but praise for the Legislature under his administration. Governor Connally said that the last 25 years he had not known such a prolific legislature. Out of the 1800 bills introduced, 600 were made into law.

One measure passed was the creation of the Texas Tourist Department, under the Texas Highway Department. Realizing that Tourism was the third largest industry in the U. S., Texas decided to compete in this industry. To accomplish this water resource measures need developing, and historic landmarks and buildings need to be restored and preserved.

This Legislature created an industrial commission to aid and assist industry located in Texas. They also allowed Insurance companies to sell insurance to persons 65 years or older on a trial basis.

Governor Connally concluded by saying that the state will end this biennium with a "nice Surplus", and that as long as he is governor, Texas will always operate in the "black".

The Good Executive

The good executive is the voice for his company. He is a reader, student, speaker, moderator, writer . . . He is the product of business and means business. What he does can produce a ripple or a tidal wave.

Although his collar is white and his shoes polished, he knows the meaning of long hours and hard work.
