Wednesday, February 27 was the date we celebrated the first meeting of the club and it was the date two were also welcomed into membership.




Being introduced by PE Chad Blanchard (at the podium), they were welcomed and received lapel pins and membership certificates by Centennial President Becky Mason.

PROGRAM PREVIEW February 27, 2013

"Rotarians' Role in the Development of Beaumont as America's Energy Gateway"

President Mason introduced Past President Jim Rich to begin the Centennial program focused on the past, the present, Rotary's role in the development of our community, and leaders. PP Rich began with February 26, 1913, the first official meeting of the Rotary Club of Beaumont, when Ed Emerson was elected First President of the Club. In 1913, Beaumont had tripled in size with a refinery, the Magnolia Refinery, associated with Spindletop. In 1918, the focus shifted to regional economic development, and the need to develop the Neches River into a deep water Port. The Rotary Club and the Beaumont Chamber of Commerce championed the building of the Port at 25 feet deep.

As Beaumont and Jefferson County grew, so did the Rotary Club, until in 1973, the Club reached a membership level that qualified for large club status. In 1972 the Club diversified, and in 1987 welcomed its first female member. A generation later, John Gary became President of the largest bank in Beaumont, and became a critical business leader who challenged the community to further expand the Port's service by increasing depth to 40ft in 1970. This deepening led to increased refining activity and economic growth. Today the Port of Beaumont is the fourth largest, and serves a host of refining, military, and similar shipping needs for the entire world. Now, in 2013, the Club's members continue to be part of an effort to expand the Port's reach by deepening it to 48ft.

Past President Rich introduced a special centennial video prepared for this centennial meeting. He

then introduced Bill Davis from Golden Pass.

Mr. Davis' goal is to communicate the excitement associated with the future of energy development in Southeast Texas. Energy development is the lifeblood of all work going on in the world. Mr. Davis displayed an impressive chart that showed the distribution of energy resource use over time, emphasizing the shift in the 1970s to great dependence on oil, and more recently, natural gas. The chart also indicated growth in nuclear, hydro, and renewable energies in the last couple of decades. The fuel mix over the next thirty years sees oil retaining its position as the most important energy resource, but natural gas should overtake coal as the second most important.

Mr. Davis demonstrated how energy use tells the tale of two different worlds. The developed world, for example the U.S., Europe, etc., whose focus is on efficiency in energy use, and the developing world, whose focus is on obtaining and developing energy resources. Since 2000, the U.S. natural gas base has doubled thanks to American innovation finding new ways to obtain and refine American natural gas resources. The new opportunity is in developing unconventional American natural gas resources. An opportunity also exists to serve a growing liquified natural gas (LNG) demand around the world. Mr. Davis explained briefly how this process will work with the Golden Pass Project in Southeast Texas. The greatest needs from this community are investment in infrastructure and quality employees.
