International Convention: End Polio



Did You Know?

Polio took a hit at this year's Rotary convention.



First there was the record-breaking climb across the Sydney Harbour Bridge that raised enough money to protect 240,000 kids from polio.

On 30 May, two days before the official opening of the convention, 340 participants ascended the bridge, eclipsing the record previously held by Oprah Winfrey for most climbers on the bridge. Waving 278 flags, they also broke the Guinness World Record for most flags flown on a bridge.

But the biggest news was the \$101 million pledged to polio eradication. Australian Prime Minister Tony Abbott opened the convention on 1 June with a commitment from his government of \$100 million to the PolioPlus campaign. Two days later, Sir Emeka Offor, executive vice chair of Chrome Group, announced a \$1 million gift to The Rotary Foundation to help end polio.

"House Bill 5: Implementation & Implications"

Region 5 Education Service Center Career and Technical Education Coordinator Candyce Tompkins presented a summary of House Bill 5: Implementation & Implications. The bill, concerning post-secondary readiness for education and careers, was passed with bipartisan support last year

The bill essentially adjusts the focus of secondary education to include career pathways as well as college readiness. This bill allows districts flexibility in the students' course acknowledging that all students don't have the same needs. More opportunities will open for a career path and this will provide for the community to partner with the education of students in a better skilled labor force. There will be a decrease in the standardized testing administered.

The result of this bill gives the districts many more possibilities and will promote districts working together to the end of the student meeting their own desired course, whether they are college or career (technical) bound. Relationships will need to be built in the communities with business and industry, with colleges and universities and other districts. The districts will be

able to change courses much more quickly in order to build and implement the course structures. There are five "endorsement" areas: arts and humanities, business and industry, multi-disciplinary, public services and STEM (science, technology, engineering and math). The districts will still be accountable to the state for their educational programs.

Students will be identifying their plan for high school by the last year in middle school and that will be signed by a parent. There are a lot of unknowns concerning the technical operation of this bill and Region 5 is working closely with the districts in order to help them understand and prepare for the changes in the future.
