

Our 1.2 million-member organization started with the vision of one man—Paul P. Harris. The Chicago attorney formed one of the world's first service organizations, the Rotary Club of Chicago, on 23 February 1905 as a place where professionals with diverse backgrounds could exchange ideas and form meaningful, lifelong friendships. Rotary's name came from the group's early practice of rotating meetings among the offices of each member.



In the initial years of this fine organization, Rotarians learned about one another and the various, diverse professions of the members by meeting in the offices, factories, businesses and firms of the club members. How about doing as one of the original members did back in the early 1900s and host a group of Rotarians in your workplace on June 8? We are primarily looking for hosts for the normal meeting time of Noon to 1:00 p.m.

The host has the opportunity to tour the visiting Rotarians around the business and share more about the company's successes and achievements. Moreover, the host can decide how he/she wishes to handle lunch: have attendees bring a brown bag, have food for those attending but ask them to pay towards the cost of the meal and drinks, or take care of lunch as a business expense. The West Brook club collected canned foods for Some Other Place, donated socks and food to the homeless, collected school supplies for children in Honduras and received the Presidential Citation from Rotary International for meeting, or exceeding all their goals and club requirements.

Not to be outdone, Kelly Interact sent volunteers to St. Elizabeth's Hospital where they sang Christmas carols. Other activities included playing bingo with the elderly at Calder Woods, spending time flying kites and hanging out with the foster children at Buckner's, raising money for polio and helping to stuff and mail over 1000 invitations to the Anayat House fundraiser. For all these activities, the Kelly Interact was also awarded the Rotary Presidential Citation.

Randy Shelton announced the winners of the Youth Service

Above Self awards. The winners were: Winston Hung, Brittanie Cockrell, Sidney Guillery, and Dorian Lewis. These students were individually honored because of the service they provide it to the community, but also the world at large.


