

The Chicago attorney formed one of the world's first service organizations, the Rotary Club of Chicago, on 23 February 1905 as a place where professionals with diverse backgrounds could exchange ideas and form meaningful, lifelong friendships. **Rotary's name came from the group's early practice of rotating meetings among the offices of each member.**



In the initial years of this fine organization, Rotarians learned about one another and the various, diverse professions of the members by meeting in the offices, factories, businesses and firms of the club members. How about doing as one of the original members did back in the early 1900s and host a group of Rotarians in your workplace on June 8? We are primarily looking for hosts for the normal meeting time of Noon to 1:00 p.m.






SCHOLARSHIP INSPIRES

"Is it time to retire the Error Cone – a.k.a. the Cone of Uncertainty?"

The Error Cone has been used to warn people - whether they are in or out of the risk zone - of hurricanes. But the Club's favorite hurricane forecaster, Chris Hebert, warns us that we need to be prepared any time our area is in proximity to the Cone. A good example of that was Hurricane Ike whose very large path continued into the upper states.

As we looked at slides of the last 5 years overlap of the Cone, it was obvious to see that the forecasting is getting better, and compared to 10 years ago, the accuracy is really

narrowing.

All storms are not the same, referencing Joaquin in 2015, as the forecast for three days was that the hurricane would continue up the East Coast with strength. The American and Canadian models were in close alignment on this storm Cone. The storm sat over the Bahamas for three days. On the fourth day, data was obtained showing the storm trailing out to the Atlantic. The reason for this was that the Gulf stream responsible for acquiring data did not fly into the storm until the 3rd day of the storm.

The model's objective is to better assess the worst case scenario with better evasive deadlines. Chris' idea of what this model should be called is "Irregular Shaped Polygon of Uncertainty."

The forecast for this year? El Nino is the highest since 1949 and we are moving quickly to La Nino with the water temperatures cooling off. Hurricanes only develop in low pressure areas and so this all means that there is a more favorable condition for hurricanes to come into the Gulf from the Caribbean. One Hurricane has already occurred this year: Alex in January. The Gulf Coast is above normal risk this year, and three major hurricanes are expected.

Thanks to Vernon Pierce and Entergy for presenting our favorite forecaster (even though his news was not the best it could be).
