Our 1.2 million-member organization started with the vision of one man—Paul P. Harris. The Chicago attorney formed one of the world's first service organizations, the Rotary Club of Chicago, on 23 February 1905 as a place where professionals with diverse backgrounds could exchange ideas and form meaningful, lifelong friendships. Rotary's name came from the group's early practice of rotating meetings among the offices of each member.

In the initial years of this fine organization, Rotarians learned about one another and the various, diverse professions of the members by meeting in the offices, factories, businesses and firms of the club members. How about doing as one of the original members did back in the early 1900s?



PROGRAM REVIEW May 18, 2016

"The Road to Better Decisions"



Craig Escamilla Lamar University by Chris Ayers

Craig Escamilla is an instructor at Lamar University and fellow Rotarian. He teaches Management in the College of Business. His speech, titled: The Road to Better Decisions, began with a story about Carter Racing. The story was incomplete but even considering the stated problems and limited information, each Rotarian had to vote whether the Carter Racing team should race or not. Ultimately, the scenario was cleverly disguised as the Space Shuttle Challenger and what decisions led to its disasterous launch.

Everyone makes thousands of decision each day and the information that is processed sometimes makes the process overwhelming. Regardless, decisions are consciously and subconsciously made. Some people make fast decisions based on gut instinct while others are slow, thoughtful and rational. Other influences in decision-making include intuition or emotion based feelings, hunches, and heuristics like shortcuts and 'rules of thumb.'

Ultimately, Craig discussed why people feel the need to make or to push to make decisions. These include the pressure to succeed, financial reasons or political reasons.
