Project Overview

Tell us a little about your project. What are the main objectives of the project, and who will benefit from it?

India has the youngest workforce of 250 million. However, less than 5% of India is formally skilled and over 81% of the labor force is engaged in the informal economy.

The industry is unable to find skilled personnel to employ, and millions of Indian youths are searching fruitlessly for jobs. There is a significant gap in the aspirations and abilities of youth and so training them in vocational courses that are industry ready is of paramount importance.

Rotary Club of Jalna Central in collaboration with Pratham Foundation, a 20-year-old NGO accredited by National Skill Development Corporation is solving challenges to offer hands-on skilling to economically disadvantaged background youth.

Our vocational programs include info asymmetry, access to hands-on training, curriculum suited for youth pedagogy, job-oriented courses through short vocational training certification skilling camps. Streams covered- Six Vocational: Plumbing, Agriculture, Housekeeping, Accounting, Healthcare and Welding.

Economic & Social Impact: This project will deploy grant towards purchase of essential tools, equipment, & cost towards organizing outreach camps for 1000 students out of which 320 students will be selected for training.

Further, the recipients will have a sustainable income resource of 170\$ to 250\$ per month earning potential with industrial placement.

Our project addresses largest gap of unskilled personnel as the industry is unable to find skilled personnel to employ, and millions of Indian youths are searching fruitlessly for jobs.

There is a significant gap in the aspirations and abilities of youth and so training them in vocational courses that are industry ready is of paramount importance. We are solving challenges to offer hands-on skilling to economically disadvantaged background youth.

Our vocational programs include info asymmetry, access to hands-on training, curriculum suited for youth pedagogy, job oriented courses through short 60 days vocational training certification skilling camps.

How did your project team identify these needs?

The project team has been working in this sector and the host club has already undertaken similar camps at own costs and donations received through Rotary funding drives and undertook a thorough demographic assessment of the community. the latest Needs Assessment is uploaded. Jalna being a center for industrial development and growth, the need for skilled workers in specific areas has come to light.

How were members of the benefiting community involved in finding solutions?

We involved an expert NGO partner Pratham Foundation, a 20-year-old NGO accredited by National Skill Development Corporation, Government of India who is solving challenges to offer hands-on skilling to economically disadvantaged background youth. through a pilot with Pratham the benefits of training youth in certain areas and becoming employable became clear, and hence the request to help get training.

Pratham Foundation offers practical hands-on training, counseling support, placement prospects to youth, post-placement alumni support and industry vetted curriculum.

How were community members involved in planning the project?

We conducted pilot project and invited applications from the youth of the economically disadvantageous background, which turn out to be overwhelming response as more than 150 youth already benefited from the free vocational training program. We have leveraged donations from Rotary fund raising drives to support this program in Jalna and envisage to launch this at scale with help of this global grant, making is self sustaining and recurring training program.

seeing the success of the pilot program, the leaders of the industries in the area and the community is interested in getting the skilling training on an ongoing basis.

Magic incubation and other capacity building program from industrial associations that currently exist will be leveraged.

Please describe the training, community outreach, or educational programs this project will include.

Streams that will be covered via this grant - 4 Vocational Courses: Plumbing, Housekeeping, Healthcare and Welding. The selected students will be trained 25-30 each month, and each stream starting in consecutive months. Prior to this training, this project will start with outreach in the community to about 1000 potential students.

The actual training will be done by professional trainers with materials, handouts, demonstrations equipment, uniforms and shoes that they can keep, then help with opportunities that will become available upon completion and getting certified followed by the placement and followup for a year.

How were these needs identified?

These are specific need based on industrial landscape of Maharashtra and overall job prospects. The current industry lacks specialized curated training program for these streams of work that the companies need. Also, future ventures planned for the area highlighted the need to have ready workforce for the planned development and growth of the planned activities.

We will award certificates to students and vocational influencers / leaders for their contribution during the public program. The certificates will carry weight in that they will be recognizable as earned through a creditable organization, and will help with employment opportunities immediately and in the future.

Jalna club with Pratham Foundation will continue this project sustainably through use of the equipment purchased and materials available at the skilling center and with appropriate adjustments to such as needed.

10. If any provision of this Agreement is determined to be illegal, invalid or unenforceable, the remaining

provisions of this Agreement shall remain in full force and effect.
