### **History of the Club**

On Tuesday evening, June 3rd, 1913, the Rotary Club of Palestine held its first meeting. Some 20 members were present. The group, which had been called together by Harry I Meyers, met at the Interstate dining room in the International Hotel. Myers, a Palestine native, had come back home in 1912 from San Antonio to join members of his family at the Grand Leader Department store. Perhaps he had heard of the Rotary Club organized in 1912 in San Antonio.

Club officers were elected with twenty-nine-year-old Myers as club president. The newspaper article about that meeting states that "the object of the Rotary Club is to promote social relations between business men."

At the time of its organization, the Palestine Club was the 75th Rotary Club, world-wide, and the 8th club in Texas.



# POLIO ERRADICATION UPDATE

#### Together, We End Polio

Terry's Polio Eradication Update For the week ending 08/30/25 Dear Polio Eradication Warriors,

One new Wild Polio paralysis cases reported this week. We are now 4 weeks since the most recent report of a child being paralyzed by the Wild Polio Virus in Afghanistan.

Pakistan -The first Polio Sub-National Immunization Days (SNIDs) of the high season will commence from September 1st 2025 in all Polio Super High Risk Union Councils.

Afghanistan - A Polio Vaccination Campaign will be held on Saturday, August 30, 2025 in the Eastern Zone areas: • Nangarhar: Sukhrod, Behsood, Khugyani, Batikot district and Jalalabad city, Laghman: Mahtarlam City. • Kunar province: Asadabad city. In this campaign, children will be given both OPV and IPV) to strengthen their immune system and prevent the spread of the virus.







**Paul Alexander,** who passed away in 2024 at the age of 78, was one of the last people in the world to live inside an iron lung—a towering, tube-like machine that kept him alive for over 70 years. At just six years old, Paul contracted polio during the devastating 1952 outbreak in Texas. The virus paralyzed him from the neck down and left him unable to breathe on his own. Doctors placed him in an iron lung, telling his parents he might not survive the night. But Paul defied the odds, beginning a lifelong journey of survival within the humming, steel confines of the machine that would become both his prison and protector.

Despite his physical limitations, Paul lived a life of astonishing courage and determination. Using a plastic stick held in his mouth, he taught himself to write, eventually earning a law degree and becoming a licensed attorney. He also authored a memoir, \*Three Minutes for a Dog\*, typing each word painstakingly with his mouth. Paul never allowed his condition to define his worth. Instead, he became a symbol of resilience, dignity, and the power of the human spirit. Friends and followers from around the world drew inspiration from his

story and admired his sharp mind, wit, and unwavering strength. Paul's passing marks not just the end of a life, but the closing of a chapter in medical and human history. His decades spent inside an iron lung are a sobering reminder of the devastating reach of polio, and the miracle of modern vaccines. But beyond the machine and the diagnosis, Paul Alexander leaves behind a legacy of perseverance and purpose. His life—brave, difficult, and deeply meaningful—touched thousands, reminding us all that even within the harshest limits, hope, intellect, and humanity can flourish.

## PALESTINE ISD OVERVIEW Larissa Loveless

PISD demonstrates a strong commitment to academic excellence, career preparedness, and inclusivity. Whether students are aiming for college acceleration, skilled trades certification, or receiving specialized support, the district offers diverse pathways tailored to different aspirations and learning needs.



The Palestine Independent School District Board of Trustees approved calling a School Bond Election for November 4, 2025. The vote follows the recommendation from district administrators who have studied and reviewed assessments of the district's campuses and facilities. Because construction costs increase by as much as 10 percent each year, the cost of these projects increases each year they are delayed, which costs Palestine ISD taxpayers even more money to fund the projects.

"It has been 16 years since the last bond election in Palestine ISD. The 2025 Bond helps address our buildings and spaces that are on average 45 years old," Superintendent Jason Marshall said. Texas school districts do not receive state funding for renovating or building new schools. Instead, they must receive funds through school bond elections. The 2025 November Bond will ask voters to consider a \$60 million package in one proposition.

operation includes growing corn, wheat, cotton, soybeans, grain sorghum, and hay, raising cattle, and offering commercial spray applicator services and timber clearing. Jordan also works as an agricultural science teacher at Elkhart High School. Their dedication and success in farming earned them top honors in both the Texas and national Young Farmer & Rancher competitions.

## 2026–27 Rotary International president



## Olayinka Hakeem Babalola

Olayinka Hakeem Babalola, a member of the Rotary Club of Trans Amadi, Nigeria, has been selected by the Board of Directors to become Rotary International's president for 2026-27. His term will begin on 1 July 2026. The Board, guided by the RI code of policies, conducted a special session to select the organization's leader after the <u>resignation of RI President-elect SangKoo Yun</u>, who decided to step back from his

Rotary responsibilities and focus on his recovery from recent cancer treatment.

Babalola began his Rotary journey in 1988 as a Rotaractor. He joined the Rotary Club of Trans Amadi six years later. His leadership roles include serving as district governor (2011-12), RI vice president (2019-20), and member of the RI Board (2018-20). He was also an active leader and participant in RI committees such as the End Polio Now Countdown to History Campaign Committee (2017-23) and the Nigeria National PolioPlus Committee (2013-present, adviser 2016-present).

Babalola received a university degree in engineering in 1988. He has worked for 25 years in the oil and gas industry, holding senior positions in Shell PLC and carrying out projects on four continents. He is the founder of two companies: Riviera Services Ltd., an oil and gas infrastructure delivery company, and Lead and Change Consulting, an executive coaching and organizational performance advisory group.

Babalola's professional affiliations include the Nigerian Society of Engineers, the Institute of Safety Professionals, and the Association of Change Management Practitioners. He is a member of Jericho Business Club, an organization in his home city that provides input to governments on economic and social policy.

Babalola and his wife, Preba, live in the city of Port Harcourt. He supports The Rotary Foundation with a named endowment and as an Arch Klumph Society member. A trustee of ShelterBox UK and director of the Safe Blood Africa project, he is a recipient of the Africa Centennial Heroes Award, the Regional Service Award for a Polio-Free World, the RI Service Above Self Award, and The Rotary Foundation Citation for Meritorious Service.

The president of Rotary International serves a one-year term, presiding over the Board of Directors and providing inspirational leadership for the organization. As the spokesperson for the global network, the president visits clubs around the world to promote Rotary's values and represent the organization at major events. Rotary chooses its president from members who have demonstrated extensive leadership experience within Rotary, including service as a club president, district governor, and member of the Board.










