RECOGNIZING THE PAST TO INSPIRE THE FUTURE

HOW THE HUB CAP STARTED

The history we have for our club between 1923 and 1946 is mostly from handwritten notes and occasional Presidents' yearly recaps found in the archives as well as stories passed down from members generation to generation.

Today we rely on our weekly HubCap to keep us informed and up to date on current Club events. So how did The HubCap get its start? This glimpse into the history of the Club comes from an anecdote in <u>Ramblings of a Country Doctor</u> written by Zack Bobo, Jr., MD:

"My good friend Bob Cooke, when he was not on the golf course or fishing off the coast, wrote the following article and published it in the *Arlington Citizen-Journal*:

In May 1946, "Doc" as president elect, along with his Vice President, Duncan Robinson, went to the Rotary Conference at Amarillo as the official delegates of the Arlington club. As their expenses were paid by the club, they went by train so they could relax, so they said. However, when they arrived at Amarillo, they discovered the two lowly alternates, Spurge Hood and the writer, who had gone there by Ford, were already waiting in the best suite the hotel had.

After we showed them how to play 42 and toured all the night clubs, we really got acquainted.

To make a long story short, Doc and Duncan cancelled their train trip and returned to Arlington with Hood and me. On the trip home the now famous *Hub Cap* was born. Bobo took over the president's job on July 1st. His Vice President Robinson was the first editor of the *Hub Cap*, and we merchants took out ads at \$5.00 each to pay for the printing, which George Hawkes did at cost."

Our archives contain volumes of written information in the past issues – it is entertaining and informative to peruse and take a trip back in time!

A <u>Tarrant County College</u> professor is headed to <u>Houston</u> to fly with <u>NASA</u>.

Raymond Benge, associate professor of physics and astronomy at the college's Northeast Campus, will board a C-9 dubbed "Weightless Wonder" for a one-day flight to conduct gravity experiments. Benge is on one of three teams selected by NASA from more than 100 Texas aerospace scholars to take part in the Reduced Gravity Education Flight Program. To prepare for the experiment, Benge will undergo a week of NASA training in Houston.

Prof. Benge has taught physics and astronomy at Tarrant County College in the Fort Worth area for 24 years. In his words: I teach physics and astronomy at Tarrant County College, a large multicampus community college in the Fort Worth area. I have also written most of the laboratory curriculum used in the physics labs and astronomy labs. Professor Benge had also been an adjunct professor at TCU 2001-2005, and before that at Richland College 1994-1998. He received his MS, Physics at Texas A&M 1988, his BS, Physics at Duke 1983, and was a teaching fellow at UNT 1988-1944. Also at UNT, he was Observatory Director 1990-1994. Chris Landrith gave us a club history moment and a bit of a laugh at the expense of
