

began Arlington Charities had served about sixty families a day. Since the pandemic began, however, that number has grown to more than two hundred families a day. Deb also mentioned that this situation was not improved by the tornado that tore the roof off the building in which Arlington Charities' offices and warehouse are located the day before Thanksgiving. However, with the contributions of seven of Arlington's Rotary clubs, Arlington Charities endured and continued serving Arlington's needlest citizens during Thanksgiving and beyond.

Vampiress Kay King announced that Rotary's next blood drive will take place on January 21, 2021 from 11:00 a.m. to 4:00 p.m. outside Create Arlington, a local business, at 306 West Main Street in Arlington. Carter BloodCare will park its scrupulously clean and disinfected bloodmobile there for that period. Kay noted that Carter's store of blood is critically low and that there is not enough blood for elective surgery by reason of the pandemic. Accordingly, all Rotarians, their friends and family members are encouraged to donate.

Assistant Membership Chair Randy Hendricks inducted three new Rotarians into the club: Emmett Rodriguez (sponsored by Hal Thurow); Malcom Chakery (sponsored by Clete McAlister); and LeeAnne Chenowith Lawson (sponsored by Peter Scott). The Rotarians present indicated their collective commitment to welcoming each new Rotarian into the club and to bring them along as good and active Rotarians.

Rotary Foundation Chair Sally Hopper announced that Rotarians Joe Way and Derek Carter recently celebrated birthdays and that Sergeant-at-Arms Steve Brooks made an online contribution to the Rotary Foundation on the occasion of his recent birthday. Sally also presented a Paul Harris Fellowship to Rotarian Esteban Blanco. Although Esteban has been a member of our club for only a short period of time this was his third such fellowship. A more deserving Rotarian would be difficult to imagine.

Rotarian Kurt Bartley introduced our club's program for the week: Kirk King, Chief Operating Officer at Texas Health Resources, a nonprofit health care company that owns and operates a number of local hospitals. Kirk King himself introduced Sunita Koshy-Nesbitt, M.D., a cardiologist specializing in Cardiac Electrophysiology. Kirk explained that he had brought Dr. Nesbitt with him to answer questions he could not.

Kirk indicated that we are at a critical stage in the treatment of Covid in North Texas and that the number of active Covid cases has recently grown exponentially. He observed that

about 1,500 Covid patients were occupying hospital rooms in North Texas at the time of our meeting, more than three times the number that occupied area hospital rooms in February 2020. Area hospitals expect between 200,000 and 220,000 more Covid patients during the next two weeks. All the area's hospitals are at capacity and new patients are "surging" into other facilities. As there are too few full-time nurses employed locally to help treat this exploding patient population it has become necessary for local hospitals to contract with "contract nurses" and with "traveling nurses" from other areas to meet the demand for treatment here.

Kirk indicated that local hospitals have received funds from the government to help manage their large and growing patient populations. He encouraged club members to wear masks, to social distance and to wash their hands frequently. Mr. King also noted that Covid is more deadly than more common viruses modern physicians have dealt with in volume. He also mentioned that we still do not know what long-term effects Covid sufferers will face in the future.

Kirk noted that remdesivir, an anti-inflammatory drug, has proven useful in treating Covid patients with lung damage. He also noted that inflammation of the lungs is the leading cause of death among Covid sufferers. Pneumonia is a major problem for Covid sufferers. However, remdesivir is not useful in treating Covid patients without lung problems. He also noted that remdesivir is useful in treating patients outside the hospital. With so many Covid sufferers in area hospitals, Kirk mentioned, it is useful for patients who can to leave the hospital as soon as possible so as to avoid further exposure to the illness.

Kirk also observed that Covid survivors should continue to wear masks, social distance and engage in frequent handwashing after their recovery because no one knows how long the antibodies our bodies develop to combat the virus will remain in the bloodstream after recovery. Moreover, even those still immune from the virus can infect others. Kirk commented that Covid is at least ten times more transmittable than the flu. He recommends that Covid survivors wait at least ninety days after recovering before returning to work and to exposing themselves to others in the community.

Kirk also mentioned that in the future there will be a new Covid vaccine every year that attempts to inoculate for the strains of Covid expected during the coming year, as with the annual flu vaccine.

One reason the pandemic grew so fast once it reached (Continued on page 4)

America, Kirk noted, is that the public health sector was not prepared for Covid-19. The situation was worsened by people relaxing the restrictions they had observed after the initial surge, resulting in community spread. In the future, he suggested, we should be prepared for mass vaccination of our citizens as soon as possible in hopes of establishing "herd immunity" as soon as possible after a virus is detected.

Dr. Nesbitt observed that there are health consequences to economic shut-downs as well as to reopening our economy. In this connection she pointed out that job loss greatly affects mental health. She also noted that when jobs are lost health insurance is lost as well. Loss of insurance, in turn, reduces the likelihood of people visiting their doctors when they experience symptoms until they feel that they have no choice. By that time the patients are sicker and the likelihood of effective treatment diminished.

Dr. Nesbitt mentioned that the first shot of the available Covid vaccines is not enough to create immunity. However, the second vaccination is enough to create the required immunity in most people a few weeks after it is administered. Significantly, some patients have acquired Covid after receiving the first vaccination. It generally takes ten to twelve days after the second vaccination before the vaccine has any effect. Dr. Nesbitt emphasized that it is necessary for each person to continue masking, social distancing and hand washing after the first shot.

Kirk complimented Arlington Fire Chief Don Crowson and the Arlington Fire Department for the great job they did planning to vaccinate the public and executing their plan. He noted that we are presently focused on vaccinating caregivers and first responders. He suggested that we pray for our physicians, nurses and respiratory therapists as they are most at risk of contracting the virus. It is because we need our first responders and healthcare workers to care for our Covid patients that we are vaccinating them first.

These comments were met with the enthusiastic approval of those present for the meeting. President Susie thanked both Mr. King and Dr. Nesbitt for their presentation and announced that the club will donate a book to the John Webb Elementary School Library in their honor with their names inscribed on the inside front cover.

Following this announcement Rotarian and Comedian Kris Landrith offered a Covid-appropriate joke. President Susie noted Rob Matwick and Matt Hicks of the Texas Rangers baseball team will speak to the club about the Rangers' prospects during the upcoming season that at our upcoming January 14, 2021 meeting. Be sure to invite a friend!

After leading the club in the recitation of The Four-Way Test, President Susie formally adjourned the meeting at 12:59 p.m.
