Clete's Corner

Arlington is known as a "veteran friendly" city and Rotarians can claim much of the credit.

For eleven years, Rotarian, Jim Persons, a member of the Arlington Great Southwest Rotary Club drove past Veterans Park and noticed there was nothing about veterans in the park. He then enlisted his Rotarian friends into creating the Veterans Park Foundation which, in turn created a memorial area of the park. Eventually they raised enough money to match an Arlington Tomorrow Foundation (ATF) grant to build the first memorial. Our Rotarian, Joe Way, was on the AFT Committee at the time and Val Gibson was chairman of the Parks Board when it was dedicated.

After Jim Persons passed away, another Rotarian, Albert Ross, brother of our own Hugh, from the Great Southwest club became president of the Veterans Park Foundation. Working with the Vietnamese community, they received another ATF grant to build the Vietnam War Memorial in the park.

I was a part of a parallel effort at the time to recognize the only Medal of Honor recipient from Arlington, Neel Kearby, although I was not yet a Rotarian when we began.

The Rotary Club of Arlington started the Arlington Heroes Run which contributed one third of its proceeds to the Veterans Park Foundation. The club also was one of the largest contributors each year to the Arlington Field of Honor. Our Rotarian, Paul Fulks, helped lead that project. Many of our club members volunteered to help. And, the very idea for a Field of Honor was originally suggested by our past president, Tom Ware. With the grant matching funds from those two events, the foundation has received yet another ATF grant; this time to build a memorial to Arlington's war dead and a memorial for Korean War veterans.

When Rotarian and former mayor Jeff Williams, was trying to convince the National Medal of Honor Museum to build here, it didn't hurt that we were in the process of holding our first Field of Honor or that the search committee had to walk by a statue of Neel Kirby when visiting city hall.

It is safe to say that Rotarians have had a lot to do with making Arlington a veteran friendly city.

invocation and the pledge of allegiance was led by Michael Glaspie, U.S. Army, Vietnam, Bronze Star recipient with Valor. The national anthem was performed by Ms. Jenn Ford, a U.S. Army veteran.

Col. James C. Quick introduced the dignitaries in attendance. There were many elected officials in attendance, including but not limited to several members of the Arlington City Council, the Mayor and former Mayor of Arlington, Texas House Representatives and two members of the Tarrant County Judiciary. Arlington Mayor Jim Ross, a U.S. Marine Veteran, presented a proclamation during last Thursday's ceremony. Mayor Ross thanked the Arlington Veterans Park Foundation and the Arlington Great Southwest Rotary Club for organizing this special event.

Our own Clete McAlister, President of the Arlington Veterans Park Foundation, Past President of the Rotary Club of Arlington and a U.S Marine Corps Combat Veteran gave an historical perspective on Arlington Veterans Memorial Park. Clete also discussed future memorials to be erected in the Park. Clete also recognized Lt. Col. Jim Persons, U.S. Marine Corps (Deceased), Mrs. Sheri Persons and Mr. Albert Ross, Captain, USAF (Deceased) for their contributions to the Arlington Veterans Park Foundation.

Former Mayor Jeff Williams talked about the National Medal of Honor Museum that is to be built in Arlington, Texas with an anticipated opening date in 2024. The National Medal of Honor Museum will preserve the legacies of our Medal of Honor recipients. An estimated 40 million individuals have served in the U.S. Armed Forces since the Civil War. Fewer than 4,000 have received the Medal of Honor- our country's highest recognition for valor in combat.

Jeff Williams introduced the keynote speaker, Captain Florent A. Groberg, U. S. Army, Medal of Honor Recipient. Captain Groberg received the Medal of Honor for his sacrifice and bravery in

Afghanistan in 2012. Captain Groberg was born in Poissy, France in 1983. Captain Groberg became a naturalized citizen in 2001. Captain Groberg joined the Army in July 2008 and attended OCS at Fort Benning, Georgia. Captain Groberg was severely injured losing 45 to 50 percent of his left calf, a blown eardrum, and a mild traumatic brain injury. Captain Groberg spent almost three years in recovery at Walter Reed National Medical Center. In addition to the Medal of Honor, Captain Groberg received a Bronze Star Medal with one Bronze Oak Leaf Cluster, the Purple Heart, the Meritorious Service Medal, as well as many others.

The Cowtown Music Club played a medley of service anthems. These included the anthems for the Navy, the Air Force, the Army, the Coast Guard and the Marines. All those veterans in attendance were asked to stand and be recognized when their anthem was played.

Mr. Trung Nguyen provided reflections of a Vietnamese-American Veteran. The Vietnamese Unknown Soldier Song was performed. Chaplain Rich Stoglin, CDR, U.S. Sea Services (FMF) Ret. Provided the closing prayer. The Honorable Brent A. Carr played Taps and the ceremony was dismissed.
