Speaker: Wendy Burgess - Tarrant County Tax Assessor

Wendy Burgess is a native Texan with deep roots in the Lone Star State and has been a proud resident of Tarrant County for over forty years. Her parents made it a priority to teach her the value of good, honest hard work from an early age. It is those same principles and values that would ultimately go on to shape her career as a successful business owner and a respected community leader.

Wendy Burgess was elected as Tarrant County Tax Assessor-Collector in November 2018. She brings over 20 years of business experience and an understanding of the complexities of leading a staff of over 200 employees in eight countywide offices with an annual budget of \$17 million dollars. This office collects \$6 billion dollars for 84 taxing entities in Tarrant County as well as the State of Texas predominately through property taxes, state motor vehicle sales tax, and registrations.

The tax assessor-collector is responsible for managing the \$17 million tax office budget. If you think about that, it sounds like a lot, but

RECOGNIZING THE PAST TO INSPIRE THE FUTURE

THE INTERESTING LIFE OF SAM WINE

Sam Wine, the first president of the Rotary Club of Arlington, moved to Arlington in 1915 as an employee of the Northern Texas Traction Company, which operated the electric trolley from Fort Worth to Dallas. The Interurban was powered


by electricity generated at the plant on Lake Erie (later submerged by Lake Arlington) in Handley. As the public transportation side of the business rapidly waned with the widespread adoption of the automobile, the electricity side took off. In time, it became a part of the Texas Electric Service Company, Wine was general manager of the Arlington District for about fifty years.

Education was always an important priority throughout our club's history. Many members either served with the school district or with NTAC (ASC, UTA). Wine served as school board trustee in 1923-31. In fact, he was involved in the affairs of the community in many different ways over the decades. He was the Arlington Masonic Lodge's Worshipful Master for the 1933-34 year. He was also involved in the creation of the Chamber of Commerce and was one of its numerous active boosters. Many older citizens remember playing on the Reddy Kilowatts youth baseball team. The entire Wine family was active in Scouting. Sam's wife, Hettie, with teacher Alice Mulkey started the first Girl Scout Troop in Tarrant County. Through it all, Sam stayed active in Rotary, serving many years as secretary.

Sam Wine was an virtually all aspects of the community's life for five decades. He died in 1965.

Wendy and her team make that \$17 million go a long way. They are the accounting firm for all of the money that comes through. And she has six people on her accounting team, and they reconcile that bank statement every single day to the penny. Why to the penny? Because it's your penny, and it's her penny. Wendy is a taxpayer, and no, she has not found the special no-tax button anywhere. She pays the same that you pay. Everyone pays the same thing. No one gets off without paying the same amount of taxes. They also support collections and disbursements.

Wendy covered the tax cycle of how money comes in and how it goes out. Wendy collects for about 1.8 million tax accounts. Tarrant County is number one in the state for the number of property tax accounts in 2021. They will probably continue to do that because of the Barnett Shale. They have mineral accounts in Tarrant County. So they have right at a million mineral accounts.

Tarrant County processes over 2 million vehicle registrations each year and titles each year for the DMV. When you get in your car, and you see the little sticker over on the left-hand side that has the number on there, from now on, you will think that's Wendy Burgess; her office does that for you. Make sure to remember here in Texas, we do the Texas Two Step. Get your vehicle inspected before you come to my office or go online to get your vehicle registration renewed. That is the Texas Two Step. Inspection first, then registration.
