Mission of Rotary

The mission of Rotary International is to provide service to others, promote integrity, and advance world understanding, goodwill and peace through its fellowship of business, professional, and community leaders.







- 1905 First Rotary club organized in Chicago, Illinois, USA
- 1908 Second club formed in San Francisco, California, USA
- 1910 First Rotary convention held in Chicago, Illinois, USA
- 1912 The Rotary Club of Winnipeg, Manitoba, Canada, becomes the first club outside the United States to be officially chartered. (The club was formed in 1910.)
- 1917 Endowment fund, forerunner of The Rotary Foundation, established
- **1932** 4-Way Test formulated by Chicago Rotarian Herbert J. Taylor
- 1945 Forty-nine Rotarians help draft United Nations Charter in San Francisco



- 1989 Rotary opens membership to women worldwide
- 1990 Rotary Club of Moscow chartered first club in Soviet Union
- 1994 Western Hemisphere declared polio-free
- 1999 Rotary Centers for International Studies in Peace and Conflict Resolution established
- 2000 Western Pacific declared polio-free
- **2001** 30,000th Rotary club chartered
- **2002** Europe declared polio-free; first class of 70 Rotary Peace Scholars begin study
- **2003** Rotarians raise more than \$118 million to support the final stages of polio eradication
- 2005 Rotary Celebrates centennial in Chicago, Illinois, USA

Scope of Rotary



- Rotary is made up of three parts: At the heart of Rotary are the Clubs, which are supported by Rotary International and The Rotary Foundation.
 - Rotary clubs bring together dedicated individuals to exchange ideas, build relationships, and take action.
 - Rotary International (RI) supports Rotary clubs worldwide by coordinating global programs, campaigns, and initiatives. A new theme is identified annually.
 - The Rotary Foundation uses generous donations to fund projects by Rotarians and our partners in communities around the world. As a nonprofit, charitable arm of RI, all of the Foundation's funding comes from voluntary contributions made by Rotarians and friends who share our vision of a better world.
- Together, Rotary Clubs, Rotary International, and The Rotary Foundation work to make lasting improvements in our communities and around the world.

Object of Rotary

 The development of acquaintance as an opportunity for service;

 High ethical standards in business & professions; the recognition of the worthiness of all useful occupations; and the dignifying of each Rotarian's occupation as an opportunity to serve society;

- The application of the ideal of service in each Rotarian's personal, business, and community life;
- The advancement of international understanding, goodwill, and peace through a world fellowship of business & professional persons united in the ideal of service.



Rotary Standard of Excellence: *The Four Way Test*

Of the things we think, say, or do ...

- 1. Is it the TRUTH?
- 2. Is it FAIR to all concerned?
- 3. Will it build GOODWILL and BETTER FRIENDSHIPS?
- 4. Will it be BENEFICIAL to all concerned?

Herbert J. Taylor (1893-1978) - President Rotary Club of Chicago (1939-40) and Rotary International (1954-55) wrote the Four Way Test during a business crisis in 1932. It was adopted as part of Rotary International in January of 1943.

Five Avenues of Service

Club Service

- Rotarians focus on strengthening fellowship and ensuring the effective functioning of the club.

Vocational Service

 Rotarians serve others through their vocations and practice high ethical standards.

Community Service

 Rotarians participate in activities that make the community a better place in which to live.

International Service

- Rotarians foster the advancement of understanding and good will among people of the world and promote humanitarian efforts around the globe.

• New Generations (added in 2010)

 Recognizes the positive change implemented by youth and young adults through leadership development activities, involvement in community and international service projects, and exchange programs that enrich and foster world peace and cultural understanding.



Paul Harris Fellowship

- In 1917 at first convention in Atlanta, Rotary established an endowment.
- Each year Foundation funds:
 - Over 1,200 Ambassadorial Scholarships for study abroad.
 - Over 150 international projects
 - Ex. PolioPlus generated \$500 million to end polio
 - Over 150 International Volunteers
 - Over 300 Group Study Exchanges
 - Peace programs that explore conflict resolution
- Contribution of \$1,000 or more over time earns the Paul Harris Fellow designation.





Please review the following suggestions as you prepare for the required classification speech. You should personalize the speech (there is no requirement to include all suggested points). You can tell us about:

- · Your profession or vocation:
 - What you do
 - Why or how you chose this profession or vocation
 - Who inspired you
 - Please do not make this talk a sales pitch for your specific company or firm.
- Your education
- . What brought you to this area (where you were born).
- Your family (as applicable)
- Your spouse's name, where you met, how long you have been married, number of children and ages, etc.
- Your hobbies and special interests.
- · Other Rotary Clubs to which you have belonged, if any.
- Anything else you want Club members to know about you.
- What you will contribute to our Rotary Club.
- · Your talk should be limited to a maximum of 3 5 minutes!

HISTORY OF THE CLASSIFICATION PRINCIPLE

When a lawyer named Paul Harris, a coal dealer, a mining engineer, and a merchant tailor first met in 1905 in Chicago, they gave birth to Rotary and, by the nature of their diverse occupations, to the association's most distinctive feature – the classification principle. Today, the classification principle, though modified, remains a cornerstone of Patary.

By encouraging active membership through diverse classifications, each club becomes a cross-section of the business and professional life of the community it serves. Also, the classification principle makes sure that no one profession or business becomes the dominant force within the club

Another benefit of the classification system is that representatives of many fields are brought together, providing the opportunity for Rotarians to broaden their knowledge of today's workplace. This, in turn, enables Rotarians to fulfill one of the basic obligations of vocational service – recognizing the worthiness to society of all useful occupations.

Meet Financial Obligations

- One Time Fees
 - Initiation Fee: \$100.00
- Annual & Other Fees

STEP 1 ENGAGE WITH YOUR COMMUNITY

Processing new members it essential to achieving Rotary's goals of providing community and international service. As a Rotarian, one of your orimany reasonabilities is to help lidentify and process new members. Consider the following approaches for finding future Rotarians:

- Wear your Rotary pin to initiate conversations about your involvement with Rotary.
- Share stories of exciting club projects with colleagues, friends, and acquaintances.
- Distribute Rotary Basics (S95-END, This is Retary (001-END, and What's Rotary? (419-END. All three are available from shoonotary.ors, the Rf Catalog, or your international office.
- Invite friends, co-workers, and colleagues to join you at your weekly Rotary meeting.
- Offer an information brochure that outlines the dub's history and highlights recent service projects and social events.
- Ask potential members to become involved with a club activity or service project.
- Encourage prospective members to tour the RI Web site, view membership videos, and complete a Prospective Member Form (www. _rotary.org/membershipreferral).

With www.rotory.org for the latest news, videos, and membership development materials.

STEP 2 COMPLETE YOUR PAPERWORK

Once a prospective member demonstrates an interest in membership:

- Complete Part A of the Membership Proposal Form, and return the form to your club secretary for submission to the dub's board of divectors.
 Remember: Do not inform the prospective member of the proposal until AFTER the board approve; it.
- Wait for the club secretary to notify you of the board's decision, which should come within 30 days of the submission.

Note: If the club board does not approve the candidate, please talk to your club secretary or board for next steps.

After your club board approves the candidate:

- Arrange an information session for the proposed member, or have the club arrange one.
- Ask the proposed member to complete and sign Part B of the proposal form. Return the form to the club secretary.
- Publish the proposed member's name and classification to the club. The Recommended Rotary Club Briaws allow seven days for club members to consider and file objections, if any.
- If no objections are received, the proposed member para the admission fee and becomes a Reporter.
- The club secretary or president immediately reports the new member to Rotary International via Member Access at www.rotary.org.
