The South Bend Rotary Club, over 230 members strong, is the largest Rotary club in the Michiana area. We are always eager to hear about individuals interested in joining our club.

Rotary International is an association of nearly 33,500 autonomous clubs in 166 countries. It is one of the world's largest service organizations. The goal for a club's membership is an up-to-date and progressive representation of the community's business, vocational, and professional interests.

Membership in Rotary requires sponsorship by a member of the club. Prospective members should:

- Hold or be retired from a professional, proprietary, executive, or managerial position
- Have the capacity to meet the club's weekly attendance or community project participation requirements
- Live or work within the locality of the club or the surrounding area

The Membership Process

The membership process usually begins with an invitation to attend one or more club meetings to learn more about Rotary. The sponsor may then submit the name of the candidate to the club's board of directors. When it is determined that the proposed member meets all the requirements, the board notifies the membership about each prospective member and seeks approval (by exception) for that individual. This process takes 30-60 days.

A Vibrant Cross-Section of Leaders

Rotary uses a classification system to maintain a vibrant cross-section or representation of the community's business, vocational, and professional interests among members. This also assists in developing a pool of resources and expertise to implement service projects. This system is based on the founders' paradigm of choosing cross-representation of each business, profession, and institution within a community.

A classification describes either the principal business or the professional service of the organization that the Rotarian works for or the Rotarian's own activity within the organization. Some examples of classifications include: high schools, universities, eye surgery, banking, pharmaceutical retailing, petroleum-distribution, and insurance agency.

Responsibilities of Membership

Members are expected to attend at least 50% of the weekly club luncheons during any six-month period. The luncheons are held at the Century Center in South Bend every Wednesday from 12:00 p.m. to 1:00 p.m. (Current luncheon cost is \$10 for salad bar, entrée and dessert.) Club members are encouraged to visit other Rotary clubs while traveling to make-up the meeting missed back home. Opportunities to make up attendance also include attending the regular meeting of another local Rotary club (there are several in the Michiana area that meet on different days), attending various other Rotary meetings, or attending a club service project authorized by the club board of directors. Occasional make-ups may also be made online through Rotary's "E-Club" web site.

Members are required to pay annual dues, currently \$225 per year, plus a one-time admission fee of \$100 upon acceptance to the club.

Members are asked to participate in local or international activities or projects of the Rotary club.

We encourage members to aspire to leadership or committee roles within the club.

Rotarians are business and professional leaders who take an active role in their community while greatly enriching their personal and professional lives. The South Bend Rotary Club comprises a diverse group of professional leaders from this community.

Members of Rotary can:

- <u>Effect change</u> within the community and the world through numerous service projects.
- <u>Develop relationships</u> with community and business leaders through weekly luncheons as well as other social and/or service activities.
- <u>Develop leadership skills.</u>
- **Become connected to the community.**
- Gain an understanding of local and international humanitarian issues.

Through its service programs, our Rotary Club can have a significant effect on the quality of life in the community. Programs of The Rotary Foundation offer opportunities to form international partnerships that help people in need worldwide.
