CHRC Members Hear from Three Area Organizations about their Activities

For the first time, we had three speakers last week, once again representing recipients of funds from our 27th annual Hole-in-One Contest. Katie Cain told us about the Chandler Police Department Victim Services Unit, Katie Kahle told us about the Chandler Care Center, and Lois Itel told us about the Assistance League of the East Valley.

Katie Cain thanked CHRC for its support in helping the **Phoenix Police Department's Victim Services Unit** follow through with its mission. They focus on working with crime victims and assuring safety measures to make sure everyone is safe.

She cited an example of a domestic violence victim who was moved here by her husband who abused her. The VSU was able to enter the case and had trouble locating the offender. But they moved the victim to a hotel, took her to the airport, and got her returned safely to her home state. She noted that that was just one case out of many.

The VSU works with officers, noting there doesn't necessarily have to be a police report. Clients (rather than victims) work with Katie and/or three other advocates who are not officers.

They use preventative measures, intervening right away before a case escalates into more violence and hardship. They even accompany clients to court.

Their Family Advocacy Center opened in July, 2018. There are no uniform officers there, although there may be detectives present. Clients are examined for strangulation and sexual assault, all done in one building.

They work through children in the schools, noting the abuser isn't necessarily a parent. The VSU also deals with elderly abuse.

"We want to make sure clients know they are not alone," Katie said.

Katie Kahle also thanked CHRC for its support. She told us the **Chandler Care Center** was established in 1995. Katie is director of the Care Center which is located in Galveston Elementary School.

The Care Center is a school-based family resource center providing access to medical, dental, counseling and social services. Most services are free of charge to families thanks to many fundraisers, professionals and service organizations

(like Chandler Horizon Rotary) that contribute financially and volunteer their services.

The Care Center mission is to promote students' school readiness, attendance and academic success by providing medical treatment, social services, parent education programs and referrals.

It works primarily through the Chandler Unified School District. The Care Center partners with First Things First, an organization that assists children in their first five years. It receives medical assistance, including examinations, prescriptions and immunizations, through Dignity Health.

"It has been an interesting year," Katie said, "mostly because of COVID-19. "Kids are getting sick a lot. We have seen incredible growth. We have added a lot of programs."

She noted the Food Bank which operated three times a week has been on hold because of the coronavirus pandemic although she hopes it will return when possible. It featured perishable as well as non-perishable items, most of which are donated. The Food bank is staffed primarily

by volunteers from Solera Chandler. The Care Center deals with about 900 families per month. She noted numbers shot up the first nine weeks of COVID-19.

They always are looking for more donations and volunteers.

Lois Eitel just became president of the Assistance League of the East Valley, one of 120 chapters in the country. Its Thrift Shop is located at 2326 North Alma School (north of Warner) in Chandler.

The ALEV provides services for children. The shop had to close March 17 because of the coronavirus pandemic. She thanked CHRC for its donation noting the ALEV had to dip into its reserve funds.

The Thrift Shop originally began as a gift shop, but they have helped needy folks with food. She noted the League has donated food items to the Chandler Care Center for its Food Bank.

They offer gifts cards to kids who need a meal. They also work with assault victims by providing Assault Survivor Kits, which include new clothing, teddy bears and hygiene kits for adults and children who are victims of assault or in crisis. They also receive assistance from

Chandler Regional Hospital. They also work in partnership with Target stores on Operation School Bell that provides children in need with in-store Target dressings or uniforms. They also provide homeless teens with clothing and provisions.

Lois said they have worked hard to get the Thrift Shop back in operation. Currently they are open for a short day from 9 a.m. – 3 p.m. Monday, Wednesday and Friday.

They provide adult day care by hosting monthly socials for the elderly and young adults with disabilities. They also award two-year scholarships to the East Valley Institute of Technology for high school seniors who plan to pursue higher education.

The League is an all-volunteer organization that includes many older citizens, many of whom have health issues. They need volunteers and donations. They accept members from all ages.
