

Ron D. Burton retired as president of the University of Oklahoma Foundation Inc. in 2007. He is a member of the U.S. Supreme Court Bar, the Oklahoma Bar Association, and the Cleveland County Bar Association. He also is a member of the American Bar Association. He was vice president of the Last Frontier Council of the Boy Scouts of America and received the Silver Beaver Award. He also received the Norman United Way and Junior League Volunteer of the Year Civic Awards.

A Rotarian since 1979, Ron is a member and past president of the Rotary Club of Norman, Oklahoma. He has served RI as district governor, Council on Legislation representative (1992 and 1995), International Assembly group discussion leader and moderator, zone trainer, RI president's representative, and aide to the RI president. He also chaired the 2011 New Orleans Convention Committee.

Ron has received the RI Service Above Self Award and the Foundation's Citation for Meritorious Service, Distinguished Service Award, and International Service Award for a Polio-Free World.

He and his wife, Jetta, are Paul Harris Fellows, Benefactors, Major Donors, and members of the Paul Harris Society, Bequest Society, and Arch C. Klumph Society of The Rotary Foundation.

Ron believes all Rotarians got involved to make a difference. In 2013 – 14, our theme and his challenge is "Engage Rotary, Change Lives.



invited, and because we made a choice to accept that invitation. Every day since then, we've been faced with another choice: whether to just be a member of a Rotary





This is the occasion where Rotarians from all of New Jersey come together to promote Vocational Service as an important aspect of Rotary, and to honor those who have been selected by their Rotarian peers as one who exemplifies the Rotary motto, "Service Above Self".

R.Y.L.A. is an acronym for Rotary Youth Leadership Award

Our district conducts an annual RYLA conference in early June targeted at high school juniors in our district. The purpose of RYLA is to emphasize leadership, citizenship and personal growth and aims to demonstrate Rotary's respect and concern for youth, provide a conference for selected youth, encourage leadership of youth by youth and to recognize publicly young people who are rendering service to their community.

This year the RYLA conference was held from June7th to 9th on the campus of Drew University. It gave the participants a flavor of what it is like to live on a college campus. There were over 60 students sent by 30 rotary clubs in our district. The program consisted of motivational lectures, group activities, leadership development, a time for fellowship and time to "hang out" and meet new friends.

Camper Bull of the Madison Club has been leading RYLA in our district for the last 25 years. The theme for this year's RYLA event was "overcoming your fears and accomplishing your dreams." At the end of the conference students were interviewed to get their impression and it was clear that the weekend was an overwhelming success. Lisa Jenkins stated, "I didn't think my life could be changed in a weekend but it was." "I can't believe how we came together as a group of strangers and now we have built lasting friendships." Sarah Bittner, Long Term Exchange Student for Germany, hosted by the Madison Club said, "This is one of the best things I have done in my stay in the United States."

Clubs can choose their own students or work in conjunction with high school guidance departments to select students. Now is the time plan and budget to send a student or two from your club in June of 2014. Cost is \$295.00 for the entire weekend. After all, these young people will be our future Rotary leaders.


