Livingston—Provided 25 food baskets for needy families working with Humans Services of the town. **Mendhams The**—Provided a chair-lift for Matheny Medical and Dental Center a Matheny School for patient/student mobility.

Mendhams The—Conducted a water enhancement project for Makgahlishe Primary School in South Africa.

Morris Plains-Updated the town community pavilion built by the club 35 years ago.

Morristown—Provided help for The Housing Partnership of Morris County to upgrade their website. **Newton**—Roteract students interviewed local World War II veterans and recorded interviews that are distributed to Sussex and Morris County high schools

Parsippany-Troy Hills-Purchased and supplied diapers for needy families.

Parsippany-Troy Hills—Constructed a play area at Parsippany Child Day Care Center.

Do you remember when we as kids jumped around the car untethered? No more! Now you not only need a car seat, but one that is appropriate for the size of the child, not overly used, and installed correctly.

The Parsippany Club and one of its members John Johnson, and the Parsippany EMS sponsored a car seat check. The comprehensive check, administered by Certified Child Passenger Technicians, took on average 30 – 40 minutes.

One family came in with 5 children, one of which was a special needs child. All their car seats failed. Through this program all were replaced and the special needs child got a seat specifically suited to him...all for free.

We spoke to his mother about Camp Merry Heart of which she had never heard and offered a scholarship (we give one every year). Unfortunately he could not qualify

This program not only filled an important need, but gave the club great community wide recognition.
