Sakuji Tanaka, a member of the Rotary Club of Yashio, Saitama, Japan, is the selection of the Nominating Committee for President of Rotary International in 2012-13.

Tanaka said he would like to see Rotary "continue its vital work as the force to improve our communities."

To do this work, Rotary needs active, involved clubs, he added. "We are fortunate to have our revised RI Strategic Plan to help build strong clubs that are vibrant, action-oriented, and relevant in the changing world."

For 32 years, Tanaka was president of Tanaka Company Ltd., a wholesale firm that went public in 1995 and later merged with other leading wholesalers in Japan. Currently, he serves as vice president of the Yashio City Chamber of Commerce and adviser to Arata Co. Ltd., an animal feed and pet food wholesaler. He also chaired the National Household Papers Distribution Association of Japan for eight years. Tanaka studied business at Nihon Management Daigakuin and Tokyo Management Daigakuin.

Currently a trustee of The Rotary Foundation, Tanaka chaired the 2009 Birmingham Convention Committee.

Avinash (Avi) Tilak is a member of Denville Rotary Club in northern New Jersey. He has been married to Vasanti (Vee) for over 30 years and has lived in Denville for the last 20 years. His daughter graduated from college this year and his son is a sophomore in college.

It seems like only yesterday that I was preparing for the year with trepidation. I leave with many fond memories and a feeling of accomplishment. I have many people to thank for the successes we have had, but the primary person to thank is you for allowing me to serve. I hope I have made you and your club just a little bit better as a result of our connection.

The spirit shown at the District Conference gives me hope, however. The Gift baskets auctioned at the conference raised \$5,400. This was the highest amount raised by the basket auction since our Centennial year in 2005. The keynote speaker on Friday night raised another \$750 for the

Foundation simply by auctioning off a tie and some wine glasses. The Yearbook ads brought in another \$2,700. So the total raised at the Conference for the Foundation was \$8,850. We are moving in the right direction. We must now capitalize on this renewed spirit. Please make sure your club gets its contributions in before June 15 so it is credited to this Rotary year. If you believe our Foundation is a worthy charity, perhaps you will consider giving just a little bit more to help the cause. I would be glad come to your club to talk about the Foundation if you think it will help; just give me a call.

As I complete my term as Governor, I ask that you shift gears and jump in with both feet to support Avi and his plans for our District in the coming year. Remember, life is short and your Rotary life is even shorter. So ask yourself, "Why am I here? What is my contribution? What can I do to make my club just a little bit stronger? What can I do to make the people in my community just a little bit happier?" And when you find your passion, define your goals, listen to the melody, learn to harmonize, join the chorus, pump up the volume and Sing Rotary's Song. Thank you for a wonderful year.

Tanaka established an endowed Rotary Peace Fellowship, and he and his wife, Kyoko, are Paul Harris Fellows, Benefactors of the Permanent Fund, and Major Donors.

He is a recipient of RI's Service Above Self Award and The Rotary Foundation's Distinguished Service Award.

Tanaka said that eradicating polio will "fulfill the promise we made to children in the world" and that "there is no doubt in my mind that the day of this success will be realized in the near future."

Tanaka and Kyoko have three children and five grandchildren.

"If we all have the fortitude to see this effort through to the end, then we will eradicate polio." Bill Gates, co-chair of the Bill and Melinda Gates Foundation

"Since 1988, Rotary International and its partners in the Global Polio Eradication Initiative (GPEI) – the World Health Organization, UNICEF, and the U.S. Centers for Disease Control and Prevention – have worked to wipe polio from the face of the earth. A volunteer service organization of 1.2 million men and women, Rotary began immunizing children against polio in 1985 and became a spearheading partner in the GPEI three years later.'

"Rotary's main responsibilities are fundraising, advocacy, and volunteer recruitment. To date, Rotary has contributed more than US \$900 million to the polio eradication effort....'


"Rotary clubs also provide the "sweat equity on the ground in polio-affected communities, which helps ensure that leaders at all level remain focused on the eradicating goal. Rotary club members have volunteered their time and personal resources to reach more than two billion children in 122 countries with the oral polio vaccine.'

"Thanks to Rotary and its partners, the world has seen polio cases plummet by more than 99 percent, preventing five million instances of child paralysis and 250,000 deaths. When Rotary began its eradication work, polio infected more than 350,000 children annually. In 2009, fewer than 1,700 cases were reported worldwide.'

"But the polio cases represented by that final 1 percent are the most difficult and expensive to prevent. Challenges include geographic isolation, worker fatigue, armed conflict, and cultural barriers.'

"The bottom line is this: As long as polio threatens even one child anywhere in the world, all children--- wherever they live---remain at risk."

Short Term Host Families Needed

Host families are needed in August to host Japanese students for one week.

This year our District is sending 30 students to Japan and our sister District 2670 sends 30 students to the United States. The Ross Redmond Short Term Youth Exchange Program has been in existence for 33 years and is one of the best programs that our district offers in meeting the Rotary Goal of fostering good will and building international understanding.

This program is made possible by the support of all clubs in the district in recruiting students, chaperoning/hosting events, providing a one-week homestay experience for two students, or through direct financial support.

Hosting a student is an exciting and rewarding experience. When you choose to welcome two Japanese students into your home you will have the chance to establish a wonderful friendship while making a difference in the life of a student. Host families learn first-hand about a foreign country and its culture from the perspective of an exchange student who has grown up there.

Host families provide, meals, accommodations, activities, supervision and care.

On weekdays, host families provide breakfast and then drop off students at a central drop off location near your home. The exchange students board a Rotary bus and spend the day in an organized activity. At the end of the day, host families pick up their students at the same location in late afternoon. Host families then take care of their students for the evening. On weekends, the students are with host families for the entire day. Having high school age students is not a requirement to participate in the program. However, if you do have High School age students, they can sometimes participate in



the weekday trips on a space available basis.

The specific dates for hosting are as follows:
Dates for clubs in the west area of the district are August 2 to August 9, 2012.

Dates for clubs in the central area of the district are August 9 to August 16, 2012.

Dates for club in the east are of the district are August 16 to August 22, 2012.

This year the District will be providing a training and orientation program in June for host families to go over the details of hosting and to answer any questions. Host families will be able to attend either in person or via webinar.
