Walt Coughlin, Ret. Secret Service Life in the Secret Service in the White House with Kennedy and Johnson

Walt Coughlin was the youngest of five children born on a farm in Iowa in November, 1934. The family lost the farm in the Great Depression and had to move to town. Both parents were

farmers and had no employable skills during these terrible days. I was placed in an orphanage in Davenport, Iowa, in the fourth grade, but I kept running away in search of my Mother. After running away three times I finally found my Mother, and when she tried to take me back to that "jail," I told her if she took me back to the orphanage, she would never see me again. She believed me and was able to borrow enough money for Mother and I to take a train to Washington, D.C. where my two older sisters lived.

I got a paper route in the sixth grade and carried that route

every morning until I finished high school. I was lucky enough to receive a scholarship to a Catholic High School (NOT FOR ACA-DEMICS BUT BECAUSE I WAS A PRETTY GOOD FOOTBALL PLAYER.) After high school I attended the University of Maryland on a football scholarship.

After college I served my mandatory two years in the Army with the 82nd Airborne Division in Germany. In 1958 I joined the U.S. Secret Service and retired in 1977. My assignments included Charleston, W. Va., New York City, The White House from 1961 to 1969, on to Louisville, Ky., Omaha, Neb., and Dallas, Tx., where I retired in 1978. During my career I visited all fifty states and more than fifty foreign countries.

After retiring I was Director of Security for Hunt Oil Company from 1978 until I retired in 2010. Married my Ann in 1965 and now have two wonderful children and five healthy grandchildren, all living here in Dallas. Who could ask for anything more??


Program: What Sets Dallas Leaders **Apart? Big Success Stories and Behind the Scenes Anecdotes**

The magazine has been financially successful and award winning, and she says it is also lots of fun. Dallas is the number four city for the number of Fortune 500 companies headquartered here. tifies the 500 most influential business leaders in Dallas. She said the people in Dallas are different in a good way. She has identified twelve things that make CEOs in



Dallas different from those in other cities.

- 1) They are big thinkers. Instead of asking why, they ask why not. An example is Klyde Warren Park, which is both expensive and an engineering feat. Since it was built, real estate around the park has jumped twentyfive percent, and it has transformed the culture of the area.
- Family is important. Despite the number of large companies, small businesses are important also. Many of these companies are multi-generational in the same family
- They are problem solvers. If they see a problem, they work to solve it. An airport was needed in north Fort Worth, so Alliance Airport was built; it is the first industrial airport and soon became a commercial hub.
- They are authentic, the real deal. They are honest and tell you what they think.
- They stand up for their beliefs. Company leaders have restructured their companies against the advice of others, but have made them more successful.
- They help each other. They are generous in their help, even to their competitors. This quite different from other cities where there is little cooperation.
- They are innovative. The microchip, the ATM and frozen margaritas are among the inventions created in Dallas. Highland Park Village was the first self-contained shopping center. Ebby Halliday and Mary Kay Ash were leaders in giving business opportunities to women.
- They are tenacious. Many leaders have had set backs or difficulty getting backing for the companies, before being extremely successful.
- They have a forgiving spirit. This could be because of their wildcatting spirit or the shared misery in the (continued on pg.3)
