Sarah Bearden Smith is a housewife, mother of three, and a woman of deep faith, who has lived in Texas all her life. Sarah's childhood was anchored by her family's faith and their participation in church activities. She was a gifted athlete and reached elite status in competitive gymnastics by the time she was thirteen years of age. Computers for Schools in Dumaguete City from Bud Naifeh

Thirteen years ago, when he and his wife were deployed by the Peace Corps to Dumaguete City in the Philippines, Bud Naifeh saw a need and began a plan to bring computers to the pub-

lic schools. His goal was to provide computer

labs for children in the third grade in every school in Dumaguete City. At first, they collected used computers and refurbished them. That also required that the schools be rewired, which was expensive. (continued on page 3)

President Richard Stanford called the meeting to order. Karl Von Bieberstein gave the invocation, noting a joy today that Chris as back with us. Patsy Watson led

the Pledge of Allegiance and "The Star Spangled Banner." Our visitors and guests were introduced. **Lisa Amsberry** introduced our Marketplace Advertiser of the week, **Lynn Surls**, CEO of Oldham Lumber.

PP **Karen Farris** explained that the Rotary international Foundation is international, and funds things like Polio Plus, clean water projects, and other projects world-

wide. The RCPC Foundation is used to fund local projects in the community. It is administered by the Community Foundations of Texas, and currently consists of about \$1.4 million, which provides about \$50,000 a year to be given in grants. The grants are used to support our collaborative partners and to fund special RCPC projects. All members are hoped to make a voluntary contribution of at least \$100 in their birth month or anytime during the year.



Herb Ziev announced a beer tasting event at Total Wine and More on Wednesday, Aug. 21, from 5 to 7 pm. Please let Herb know if you are attending so there will be

enough seats. PP **Pam Carvey** explained that PCR Connect will be on the third Thursday of the month this year, but will alternate between a 5:00 pm happy hour and a 7:30 am breakfast. President **Richard** reminded all of those who have not yet paid your dues to do so; penalties are accruing. He also mentioned that the deadline for considering grants from the RCPC Foundation is August 15, so if you want to suggest a honest pricing for fossil fuels, no more socializing the cost of emissions. They advocate for energy innovation and a carbon dividend. Charging a carbon fee that will be predictable will allow businesses to plan for it. Then the proceeds will be returned to the consumer. She said the plan would accomplish a reduction of carbon emissions by forty percent, and it would return about \$3,500 back to families.

Howard Parker introduced our speaker today, Ann Drumm from the Citizens' Climate Lobby, who



spoke on a market base solution to climate change. She said that her father was a petroleum engineer who liked to snow ski, but climate change is presenting great risks to the snow skiing industry.

She feels the values of Rotary and congruent with the goals of the Citizens' Climate Lobby. CCL is focused on a single policy solution to climate change. They meet with Congressmen several times a year, sometimes in Washington and sometimes in their districts. They believe that their solution is "fair to all concerned" in that severe weather, drought, floods, fires, etc. affect the poor the most. She said she was not going to talk about science, and recommending the work of Dr. Katherine Havhoe and her works on "Climate Weirding." She gave the examples of fires in Alaska and Siberia, flooding in the Midwest and droughts in India as unusual weather patterns. She said that their was a heat dome over the Arctic and that 2018 was the hottest year on record. She said that the IPCC reports that we have twelve years to cut emissions by forty percent. She asked would a practical, livable solution end the climate controversy? She said a low carbon industry is not a challenge of science, but a challenge of will. Good policy is effective and good for the economy. CCL advocates honest pricing for fossil fuels, no more socializing the cost of emissions. They advocate for energy innovation and a carbon dividend. Then a typhoon came through and destroyed what they had started. So, the plan was changed to provide tablets to the children; that had the advantages of being less expensive and more portable. They did not get permission from the Dept. of Education in Dumaguete City, so they implemented the plan in the suburbs.

It was so successful that the Mayor of Dumaguete City contributed \$42,000 for the project, which, in addition to the grants from RCPC and Rotary International, raised the total to \$107,000. The new "computer learning centers" have been put in every public elementary school in the city, and serve 13,500+ third thru eighth graders, and will for many years. It will help the students succeed in future education.
